**CONFERENCE HELPS CHURCH SCHOOLS**

Weaverville College Is to Get \$27,500, According to the Plans of Conference.

**FRIENDS IN ASHEVILLE ARE MUCH PLEASED**

Fund of \$2500 to Be Made Available at Once, \$25,000 from Fund to Be Raised.

One of the most important matters connected with the work of the Western North Carolina Methodist conference, recently closed at Statesville, was that of the educational committee, at whose suggestion an educational secretary was appointed for the purpose of raising money for the schools and colleges belonging to the conference. Rev. L. B. Abernethy was appointed to the position with a salary of \$2500 per year.

That which will most interest the people of this section, however, was the fact that Weaverville college, which has a large number of supporters in this city and community, is to be greatly benefited in a financial way at the recommendation of this committee. The committee recommended that a fund of \$140,000 be raised by the secretary and of this Weaverville is to receive \$25,000. It is understood that this amount is to be expended in buildings and equipment. This report was known as No. 1 and in addition to this the college will get a smaller amount from the budget.

In speaking of the larger amount to be raised, a prominent Methodist of the city, a former student and well-wisher of Weaverville college, stated that he had no doubt that the secretary would be able to raise the \$140,000.

For a long time the conference has been considering the matter of financing the secondary institutions and the gentleman above referred to said that the opinion had begun to prevail among the members of the conference that it is time these institutions are getting some help, and that they are doing as good work as, or probably better, than the larger colleges.

An educational committee has been at work for a year or more on the finance problem and it held two mid-year meetings during the past year to consider such matters. One of these meetings was held at Durham and the other at Statesville, and at each of them it was the consensus of opinion that it was time something is being done for the smaller institutions.

**REALTY MARKET ACTIVE WITH S. A. LYNCH IN IT**

**Energetic Dealer in Land and Houses Makes Two More Purchases.**

During the past few months S. A. Lynch has been very active in the real estate field. He has bought a number of good residences in the city and has sold about as many. Today he bought two residences at auction, which were sold under deed of trust. The first of these was the boarding house on Ashland avenue known as the "Bon Air." The other was the John Herren residence on Baird street.

The "Bon Air" was sold by C. W. Brown, as trustee, under a deed of trust given by J. W. Cook to G. L. McDonald for the purchase price. The property had been sold to Mr. Cook by J. E. Johnson and a second mortgage given, which had been transferred to B. H. Brown of Spartanburg. The sale was made under the first mortgage and Mr. Lynch bid it in for \$2900.50, which, it is said, will a little more than cover both the first and second mortgages. Sometime ago a receiver had been appointed in connection with the second mortgage, for the collection of the rents.

At the time of sale the property belonged to P. P. McLean, to whom Mr. Johnson had conveyed his equity.

**Argument Heard by Judge Lane.**

Yesterday and today in the court room and in chambers Judge Lane heard arguments in the matter of a restraining order and a contempt rule in the case of W. P. Swayngin vs. Asheville Lumber company. The matter of the contempt rule was transferred to him by Judge Webb from Bryson City and was heard yesterday but was not decided, and the hearing of the restraining order will be continued this afternoon at 5 o'clock. The defendants are restrained from making the sale of certain property of the plaintiff on which a mortgage is held and the rule for contempt grew out of this.

**Hoke Smith Quits as Governor.**

Atlanta, Nov. 15.—Hoke Smith, Georgia's new United States senator, is ready formally to tender his resignation as governor. The official action takes place late this afternoon. Tomorrow John M. Slaton, president of the state senate, becomes governor to serve until Smith's successor is chosen.

In the case against W. J. Holland, charged with the murder of J. N. Edwards, Judge Lane this afternoon signed an order in habeas corpus proceedings allowing the defendant to give a bond in the sum of \$5000.

In Superior court the case of H. P. Devine vs. Burton & Holt will go to the jury this afternoon, after which it is thought the Cocke divorce case will come up for adjudication.

**CITY NEWS**

Jim Flaney was found guilty in police court this morning of assault with a deadly weapon and was given 20 days on the county roads.

The members of the city fire department will assemble tomorrow afternoon at the High school building at 5 o'clock for indoor and net practice.

J. W. and Frank Hill were arrested this morning for an assault upon each other. The difficulty occurred last night in the city market, but no damage was done.

Arguments are being heard in the case of United States vs. the Hiawasee Lumber company in federal court today. These will probably consume two days. The evidence was completed yesterday.

Prayer meeting tonight at North Asheville Methodist church will be conducted by Rev. G. G. Harley. As Rev. Mr. Harley will leave soon to take charge of his new work in Concord, this will be his last service here.

H. L. Finkelstein and his brother, Neil Finkelstein, leave this afternoon for New York to buy fixtures for their new store on Patton avenue, which will open about December 1. It will be called the Crescent Jewelry and Loan company.

The fire department was called out today on account of a blaze on the roof of the house of John Hammond on South Main street. It is thought that the fire started from sparks from the chimney. It required only a few minutes to extinguish it.

The funeral services over the remains of H. R. Cook, who died yesterday morning at his home on Grove street will be conducted by Rev. C. B. Waller from the residence tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Interment will be at Riverside cemetery.

Information has reached Asheville that the \$225,000 fire reported from Muskogee, Okla., Sunday morning was in the building of Eite & Rowsey. It was a three story building of brick, and covered an entire block. Dr. Eite, one of the owners, is a frequent visitor to Asheville.

According to contract, the repairs and extension work on the police court room should be finished today but it will not be done. An inspection of the place shows that there is much work to be done yet and a conservative guess would place the time of completion at least 10 days hence.

In Superior Court today Judge Lane signed a consent judgment in the case of Robert Vance Davis vs. Evans Maxwell, J. P. Chappin and the Hudson Motor Car company, by which the plaintiff is to receive from the defendants the sum of \$200, the defendants also to pay the costs.


