WHO OWNS THE CORPORATIONS?

An interesting article in the New York Saturday Times calls attention to the fact that the large railroads and industrial corporations of the United States are owned by no less than 2,000,000 persons. "Four years ago the railroads were owned by 250,000 shareholders," says the article. "Now there are 500,000 owners who share the \$300,000,000 disbursed in dividends. The average shareholder's income of \$600 a year is just equal to the average earnings of the 1,500,000 workers on the railroads who receive \$300,000,000 wages a year." The article points out that every one who has a saving account in a bank or an insurance policy is indirect owner of many large corporations, since funds of the institutions are invested in stock and bonds. It is pointed out that forty capitalists own less than one-tenth of the stock of the Bell telephone companies; the other nine-tenths being divided among more than 24,000 investors.
