COMMITTEE HERE WITH HOTEL PLANS

Men Who Conferred with E. W. Grove Are Optimistic, but Silent.

Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, E. L. Ray, H. W. Plummer and J. G. Merrimon, returned this morning on the Carolina Special from St. Louis, where they went last week to confer with E. W. Grove concerning the plans for the building of a tourist hotel at the foot of Sunset mountain. W. F. Randolph, who preceded them to St. Louis, returned with the committee.

Nothing was given out as to the result of the St. Louis conference, further than that the details of the plan were discussed. No legal action was taken in drawing up an agreement and it is stated that none can be taken until the committee makes a report of the proceedings in St. Louis to the bodies here it represented—the boards of directors of the various banks of the city. However, it may be said that they are quite sanguine over the prospects for a new hotel for Asheville. There is every reason to believe that Asheville interests will lend whatever co-operation may be desired.

It will be recalled that an outline of the proposition as advanced by Mr. Grove was published in The Gazette-News last week. This proposition was to the effect that if the local banks would take over \$100,000 in bonds of a \$250,000 issue which Mr. Grove proposed making, the hotel would be built. A committee of Asheville men was asked to go to St. Louis at once to confer with Mr. Grove and as a result the above named committee went on the following day. The report of the committee will be made this week.

COTTON MILL RECEIVERS HAVE FILED REPORTS

Saturday afternoon W. T. Weaver and Allen T. Morrison, as receivers, filed their reports in the office of the clerk of Superior court in the case of W. T. Weaver Power company and other creditors against the Elk Mountain Cotton mills. The reports showed that the total amount handled by the receivers was \$329,000, both receipts and disbursements. The report was confirmed by Judge Lane, and orders were made allowing receivers' and attorneys' fees.

As receivers, Allen T. Morrison is allowed \$1000 and W. T. Weaver \$200; as attorneys, Bourns, Parker & Morrison are allowed \$500. The company was placed in the hands of the receivers under decree of the late Judge J. S. Adams in June, 1909.

SAVED FROM THE SEA

Men Rescued from Sinking Barge as Wind Drives Craft to the Shore.

New York, Nov. 29.—After a thrilling rescue from the sinking barge Helen last night, near Block Island, four men were landed this morning at New London by the tug Mary Sully, which made the rescue. The western coast of Block Island is strewn with the wreckage of the barge Vermont, which sunk Friday, drowning two.

Ransom camp No. 1, Woodmen of the World, will give a banquet tonight in honor of Col. B. W. Jewell of Oxnard, Neb., after the regular business session is over. Col. Jewell is a prominent Woodman who is visiting in Asheville for a few days. At the business session he will undertake to answer any questions the members wish to ask relating to the organization.

C. C. Clark, through his attorney, Judge J. D. Murphy, has instituted suit in Superior court against Julius A. Walker for \$5000, for damages on account of alleged injuries received while the plaintiff was employed at the defendant's sawmill at Black Mountain in January, 1910. The injury, it is set forth, occurred while the plaintiff was using an "edger," his hand being mutilated.

Yesterday was a great day at the First Baptist church. There were large congregations morning evening, many requests for prayer at the evening service. The pastor, Rev. C. B. Waller, delivered two most excellent sermons. The congregation readily raised \$350 to complete a balance of \$500, to be reported at the celebration for a very fine film. The Sunday school raised \$60 for the orphanage cause.

T. J. Cook of Juno was in the city today and told about the burning of his barn near that place last Thursday afternoon. Besides the building, seven hogs, a calf and a \$500 gasoline engine were destroyed in the fire and Mr. Cook stated that the entire loss would probably be between \$900 and \$1000. The barn was burned in almost the same spot where one was burned for Mr. Cook about four years ago.
