ASHEVILLE MOTOR CLUB

HOLDS ANNUAL BANQUET

Toasts Responded to and Officers Elected—Number of New Members.

The members of the Asheville Motor Club met around the annual banquet board last night for the enjoyment of a feast, both of meats and of the "soul," for the time was greatly influenced by excellent after-dinner speeches and appropriate toasts. The banquet was served in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium by the Candy Kitchen and the toastmaster was Dr. Paul H. Ring, who introduced the speakers and delighted the whole assembly with a number of witty toasts. Before the banquet departed they extended a hearty vote of thanks to the Y. M. C. A., the Candy Kitchen and the entertainment committee, all of whom had contributed largely to the success of the affair.

Among the speakers at the banquet were: Dr. W. L. Dunn, Mark W. Brown, H. C. Chedester, Dr. M. H. Fletcher, Frank Loughran and Dr. C. Ambler. Each of these gentlemen referred to the laws of the city governing automobiles and other motor-propelled vehicles, expressed themselves as heartily in favor of such laws and spoke for the club in their assurance that every member would do all in his power to abide by these laws and to see that others did the same. They also insisted that the "autoist" has rights on the public highway as well as any other person and asked that this right be recognized. They expressed their approval of the proposed city ordinance to have all drivers licensed and have these licenses given by an examining board. A motion to endorse it was unanimously carried.

The members of the board of aldermen were among the invited guests at the banquet and short talks were heard from R. L. Fitzpatrick and A. B. Sites, regarding the automobile laws of the city. They expressed their confidence in the club members in their efforts to abide by these laws and to aid the city in their enforcement.

Following the banquet, the members proceeded to elect new officers for the ensuing year and the following were elected: President, Eugene Sawyer; Vice President, Dr. Carl V. Reynolds; Secretary and Treasurer, D. L. Jackson. The following members of the board of governors were elected: Dr. M. H. Fletcher, Dr. A. W. Callaway, H. C. Chedester and Mark W. Brown. The following new members were elected: Frank M. Weaver, P. A. Donahoe and A. S. Barnard.

THE MARKETS

Cotton Steady and Lower. New York, Nov. 24.—The cotton market opened steady today as a decline of 2 to 4 points under selling by houses with Liverpool connections and scattering liquidation, supposedly inspired by the estimate of Memphis paper placing the yield at 15,045,000 bales.

Trading continued very quiet and the market at midday was within a point of the opening figure.

REVENUE MEN ACTIVE

Two more blockade parties in Durham and Wake counties have been ripped in the worm; more white lightning has gone to waste, and more still beer has been sent percolating through the crust of the earth to feed the springs, brooks and mayhap little fishes. One of the stills destroyed was in Carr township, Durham county, and it was an 80-gallon affair. Fermenters and other apparatus were destroyed, together with some liquor, but the plant was not in operation. The other still was in New Light township, Wake county. Here 2000 gallons of beer was poured out. The plant was not running and the still had been removed from the furnace. Deputy Collector K. W. Merritt and Posseman F. W. Knight were the raiding officers.

News is expected at any time of the death of Cary of Deputy Marshal J. B. Jordan, one of the best officers in the government service, who is critically ill with pneumonia—contracted, no doubt, while raiding in Durham county last week. The last report from Mr. Jordan's bedside was that he was barely alive. He is unconscious and can hardly survive many hours. He was a member of one of two raiding parties which ran across and fired into each other near Chapel Hill over four years ago and was badly wounded at that time.
