New York, Nov. 25.—Movements were irregular at the opening of the stock market today, with a sagging tendency in a majority of the more active issues.

Prices picked up with some spirit after the initial display of heaviness. Purchases, however, slackened when active stocks rebounded slightly above yesterday's closing figures.

The market closed heavy. Professional holders sold stocks more freely and there were some sharp declines in railroad sections.

Cotton Steady, But Eased Off.

New York, Nov. 25.—The cotton market opened steady at unchanged prices to an advance of 1 point. There was some scattered covering for over the week-end but also some scattered liquidation, and the market eased off to loss of about a point during early trading, with business quiet.

The market closed barely steady, with prices net 4 to 9 points lower.

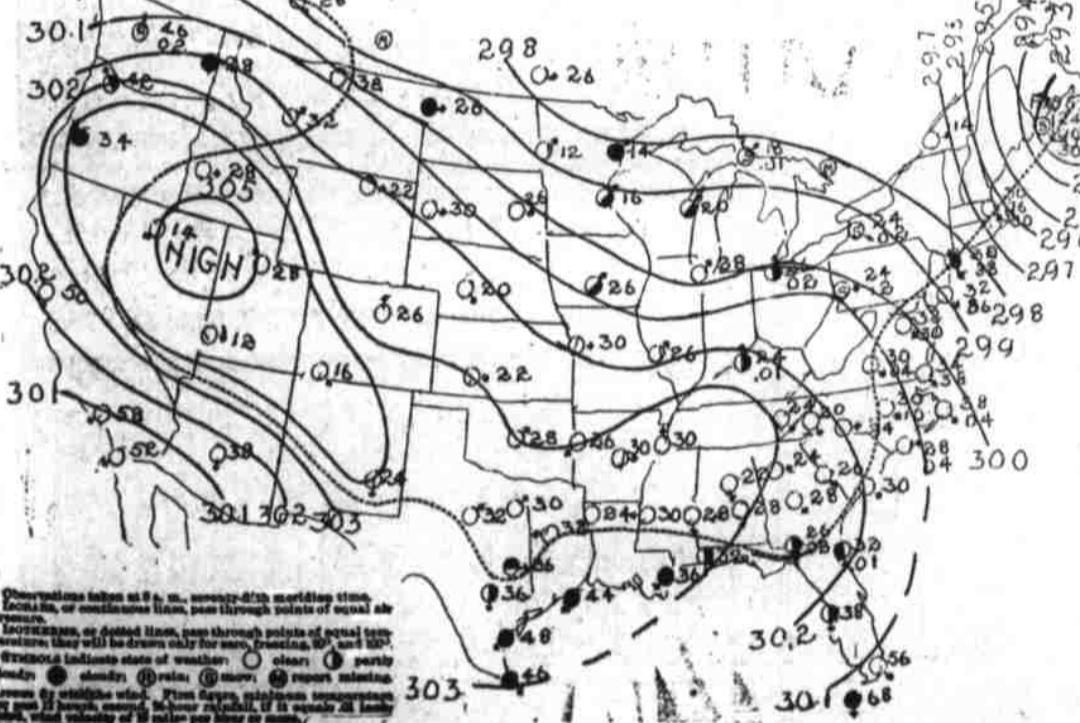
TRUSTEE'S NOTICE
