getting some of the money out of this section that he evidently thought, was out of circulation when the banks were opened.

All these banks have to have some designated depository in which to place the funds and at present the branches at Hendersonville, Canton and Biltmore are sending their deposits to the Asheville postoffice which is considered the central depository for its section. The funds here are deposited in the Citizens bank, which makes it the final depository of these smaller offices.

The bank at Marshall has evidently recognized a good thing, or at least what it thinks is a good one, and has qualified to handle the funds of the Postal deposits there. It is reported that the Waynesville bank is likely to do this at a very short time, and unless this is done, Asheville will be named as the depository for the postal bank there.
