## SLAIN BY MASKED MEN

### Robbery Supposed to Have Been Motive for Dual Murder Near Shelby.

Shelby, Dec. 14.—Mr. and Mrs. John Dixon were murdered near Bethel church between 11 and 12 o'clock some time Tuesday night by two unidentified men whose faces were covered with white caps. Several posses are in search and bloodhounds are trying to find a trail. A negro, John Ross, went by the house yesterday when he found Mrs. Dixon lying on the floor in a pool of blood. Her husband lay dead at the bars and she was dying, but had enough breath to mutter a short story that two men had called during the night and asked that Mr. Dixon go with them and help get a horse out of a ditch. He lighted a lantern and went out. He went and later she attacked the men and beaten. She fled before the neighbors responded to the message delivered by the negro. Dixon was one of the most prominent farmers in the county, about 20 years old. He married Miss Clayton Cline, daughter of A. M. Cline, of another prominent family. They had a child in the house about one year old, but the child was left unharmed. It had blood on its clothes from its mother. It is supposed the strangers were looking for money. There was \$40 in the house and this was gone.

### Robbery Suspects Released.

Atlanta, Dec. 14.—Three men arrested yesterday as suspects in the Hardeeville (S. C.) train robbery Tuesday were released last night, the police deciding they had no cause for holding them longer. The men arrested were Ed. and C. G. Gibson and J. L. Parker, farmers.

### Progress in Bathship Building.

Washington, Dec. 14.—Normal progress was made last month on the construction of warship building for the United States, according to the monthly bulletin of the bureau of construction and repair. On December 1, the bathship Wyoming was 74.9 per cent completed; the Arkansas, 80; the New York, 7.5; the Texas, 26.1.

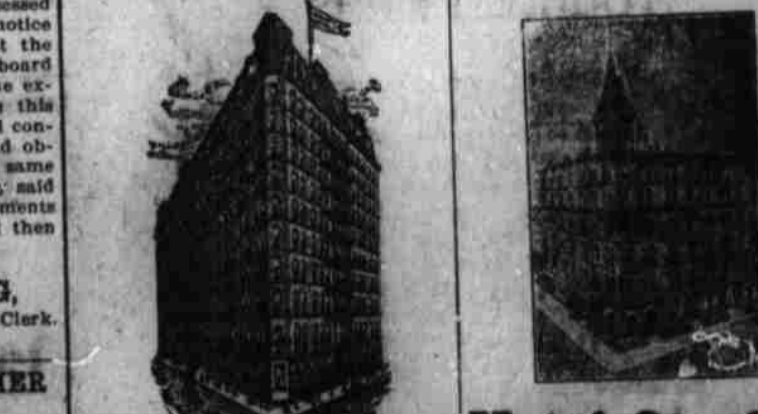
