THE NATIVE CORN BEAT THE PROLIFIC

Demonstrator Weaver Sums up Some Results of the First Year's Work.

NEARLY TWO HUNDRED ARE ENROLLED FOR 1912

With a Good Season, It is Expected Buncombe Yields Will Be Greatly Increased.

E. D. Weaver, county demonstrator of agriculture, is very well pleased with the results in farming obtained by his assistant demonstrators and the farmers in general during the past crop season. While these results were fair, he is determined next season will show much better and is already at work with a vim, with this object in view. He has already appointed a large number of demonstrators co-operators and he thinks that with a good season Buncombe county may make some history in the line of corn raising. Mr. Weaver today spoke of some of the things that have been accomplished and told of some of the corn yields, taking the information from his reports sent to the department.

"I have reports of 50 demonstrators," he stated, "whose yields run from 20 bushels to 130 bushels to the acre, averaging 65 2-5 bushels. In the prolific variety of corn, I find by taking the five highest yields that the average is 93 bushels to the acre, in round numbers. Taking the five highest yields of those who raised our native corn, I find that they made an average of 102 bushels to the acre, a balance in favor of our native corn of nine bushels. However, this might be overcome by giving the prolific variety time to more thoroughly adapt itself to the soil and climatic conditions.

"I have in my reports the names of several co-operators who have made from 40 to 90 bushels per acre. Considering the severe drought we endured, such records must look good to every citizen who feels a pride in our great old county's progress.

"We have enlisted for the coming year 171 demonstrators and over 190 co-operators, some who say they are determined to see 200 bushels of corn made on Buncombe soil. So you might look out and need not be surprised at anything, for with a favorable season and the right admixture of enthusiasm, brains and Buncombe dirt, something is bound to happen."

MOVING PICTURES MADE FROM GROVE AUTOWAY

Panoramic View of City from Top of New Hotel, Also Trip to Round Knob.

Freeman Owens, representing the Chicago Industrial Moving Picture company, who has been here for the past few days taking pictures of scenes in Asheville and the surrounding country, went to Round Knob this morning in company with N. Buckner, secretary of the board of trade, to get some views there. It was raining when they reached Round Knob and they were unable to get any pictures. Mr. Owens has already spent two days in the city and has secured a number of views of various places. Yesterday he took a ride over the Grove autoway and made a film by spinning along at a rapid rate in an automobile. He also obtained a panoramic view of the city from the top of the North State hotel.

Yesterday, in company with Dr. Buckner and C. F. Ray, he went to the site of the Weaver Power plant and took some pictures there.

Before he leaves he will get some views on the Saluda road and will also make another trip across the ridge to Round Knob.

NEW CHURCH BUILDING PLANNED; LOT PURCHASED

Baptists Will Erect Edifice at Bartlett St. and French Broad Ave.

The trustees of the First Baptist church have purchased a lot at the corner of Bartlett street and French Broad avenue from Zeb. B. Hood and contemplate the building of a modern church there. The price paid for the property is given in the deed as \$2700. It is planned that the church will be controlled and owned for the present by the First Baptist church, as are the other missions, but it is thought that within a short time it will become self-supporting.

The plans of the trustees have not as yet fully crystallized as to the details of the construction, but a building committee has been appointed and it is intended to erect a church and Sunday school for the Baptists of that section. For some time it has been considered that such an institution was needed in that part of the city, as it is stated that the membership of the church there is increasing fast in number, and there is need for a church nearer their homes where they can worship.
