MANY DEFENDANTS FAIL TO PUT IN APPEARANCE

Superior Court Grinds Out Much Grit, but Few Jury Trials Are Had.

A great many cases are being disposed of in one way or another in Superior court, but there have been few jury trials. In many cases the defendants themselves have failed to show up and in many others the witnesses were absent. This morning case after case had to be called before one was ready for jury trial. However, a great many defendants have submitted and a few not prosed with leave have been taken by the solicitor.

The most interesting cases disposed of this morning was that against C. C. Seawell for not keeping proper records of sale of whiskey on prescription. The case was taken up yesterday, and this morning the defendant entered a plea of nolo contendere, following which the judgment of the Police court, from which the case had been appealed, was confirmed. This was a fine of \$100 and the costs.

A number of orders were entered with reference to evictions and judgments in case of absence of defendants and witnesses, and some sentences were imposed in unimportant cases.

Among the sentences imposed were the following:

Frank Blackwell, \$15 and costs for cruelty to animals.

Poster for 12 months for larceny; Stanley Forney, 12 months on the same charge in two cases.

Dolph Nichols, three months for larceny.

Thomas Williams, two months for retailing.

Yesterday afternoon O. C. Mills was given a sentence of 16 months on a false pretense charge, and a number of miscellaneous cases disposed of.

The trial of the case of Claude Goodlake, charged with the seduction of Euba Luthers, who recently committed suicide, was set for Thursday, and the trial of Walter Holland, charged with killing J. M. Edwards, is set for Friday.

NEW PLAYER SIGNED BY BASEBALL MANAGEMENT

"Topsy" Cahill Will Try for Outfield—Three Recruits Get Pink Slips.

The management of the Mountaineers has signed another player for a try-out and he is expected to arrive in the city this afternoon. This is "Topsy" Cahill of Massachusetts, and he comes here highly recommended as a baseball artist. If he proves efficient with the willow he will probably be the last recruit for the outfield, and then the entire attention of Manager Kling may be turned to the development of the infield and pitching staff.

Three of the squad who have been here in the try-outs so far were handed "pink slips" yesterday afternoon. It being considered that they were not exactly the proper material for a team such as the Asheville club proposes to put into the game. These men were Goerlin, Brivevogel and Lyon. The first was trying for an outfield position, the second for short stop and the latter for pitcher.

There will be an exhibition game this afternoon at Riverside park between the league team and the Buncombe All-Stars and another tomorrow with the Fern school team. This will end the exhibition games, and the rest of the week will be devoted to hard practice and the learning of the signals for the season, in preparation for the opening at Johnson City next Monday.

Manager Kling is in good spirits over the prospects for the team, and he believes that the Mountaineers will have no trouble in hitting a stride that will be hard for the other teams in the league to follow. The fans are sanguine too, and the prospects are that the game will be well patronized here this season.

The directors of the Asheville Merchants association have a meeting tonight at 8 o'clock.

President O. S. Dean of Weaverville college has been secured as the speaker at the Y. M. C. A. men's meeting for next Sunday afternoon. The subject of his address has not yet been announced, but a large number of the men of the city are expected to attend this meeting.

In United States District court this morning Henry Justice was found guilty of retailing whiskey. Bud Hayes, James Byers and James Molden were found guilty of illicit distilling and Joe Denton was found not guilty on the same charge. No judgments were entered.

Notice has been given to the residents and visitors in Asheville that the entrance to the Asheville school grounds by way of the Haywood road has been closed, and the only entrance now open is by way of the Guder road, which turns to the left at the end of the West Asheville car line.

Adjutant General R. L. Leinster has sent transportation to the 277 commissioned officers of the N. C. N. G., with orders that they gather at Raleigh next week for personal instruction in the course they have been studying by correspondence during the past several weeks. They will go Monday and remain until Saturday. The officers will be examined by Capt. A. J. Daugherty of the United States army and Brigadier General Royster of the N. C. N. G.

Lightning Hits Man on Box Car

Negro Brakeman Has Skin Burned and Great Toe Splintered by Bolt but Lives.

Exposure Killed Most of Titanic Victims.

Hullfax, N. S., May 7.—Only one of 17 persons whose bodies were recovered by the cableship Minia in the vicinity of the Titanic tragedy died from drowning, in the opinion of the cable ship's physician. The other 16 perished from exposure, death ensuing some four hours after the vessel sank. This was demonstrated by examination of the bodies, water being found in the lungs of but one person.

Drops From Monoplane Killed.

Berlin, May 7.—Aviator Bachmayer was killed when his monoplane fell 150 feet at the Johannisthal aerodrome.
