**ASHEVILLE PICTURE IN "TRAVEL'S" MAY NUMBER**

A large number of friends attended, including many of the office men, motormen and conductors of the Asheville Light and Power company. A great profusion of flowers bore beautiful witness to the affection and sorrow of friends throughout the city.

The pallbearers were Thomas J. Brookshire, Julius C. Martin, Garland A. Thomason, Dr. F. T. Meriwether, B. M. Jones and Earle Godbey.

Mrs. Wiggin was a member of prominent and cultured Maine family, and was a gentlewoman of beautiful character. During a residence of about 12 years in Asheville she won the esteem of all who knew her. She was singularly unselfish, and her joys were in sympathy and ministry for others. She ardently loved everything beautiful. During her last illness, after she knew she could not long survive, she would send tokens and write messages of good cheer, with her own feeble hand, to her friends.
