## BELIEVE BOY KILLED BROTHER BY ACCIDENT

### Police Investigate Raleigh Tragedy—Two Applicants for Court Clerkship.

Gazette-News Bureau, Raleigh, June 25. Maj. J. J. Barnard and Maj. Leo D. Heurt, both of this city, are applicants for the position of clerk of the United States court at Raleigh. It was said today. Petitions are said to be circulating in their behalf. No vacancy exists yet, as George D. Green, whom Judge Connor had in mind, would not have been appointed until this week. Friends of George L. Tompanski, the deputy clerk, are suggesting that he might enter the contest. It was said here, however, that the appointee will be a resident of Wilton.

The police are now strongly inclined to the belief that Levern Betts, the 15 years old boy under arrest, killed his brother, Clifton Betts, by accident. Raymond Betts, another brother, says that Clifton told him the cutting was accidental. Much sympathy is expressed for the boy and his brothers. The funeral of Clifton Betts was held yesterday afternoon.

### SUES FOR \$2000

#### Charley Miller Seeks Damages on Account of Mental Anguish and Personal Injury.

Charley Miller, by his next friend, James Miller, has filed complaint in the office of clerk of Superior court, in a \$2000 damage suit against the Southern railway for alleged mental anguish and personal injury. It is contended that the plaintiff was forcibly and roughly ejected from a train by a conductor because he was attempting to ride on a half-fare ticket; also, that he was under 12 years of age and had a right to ride for half fare; that he received rough treatment at the hands of the conductor and suffered much mortification.

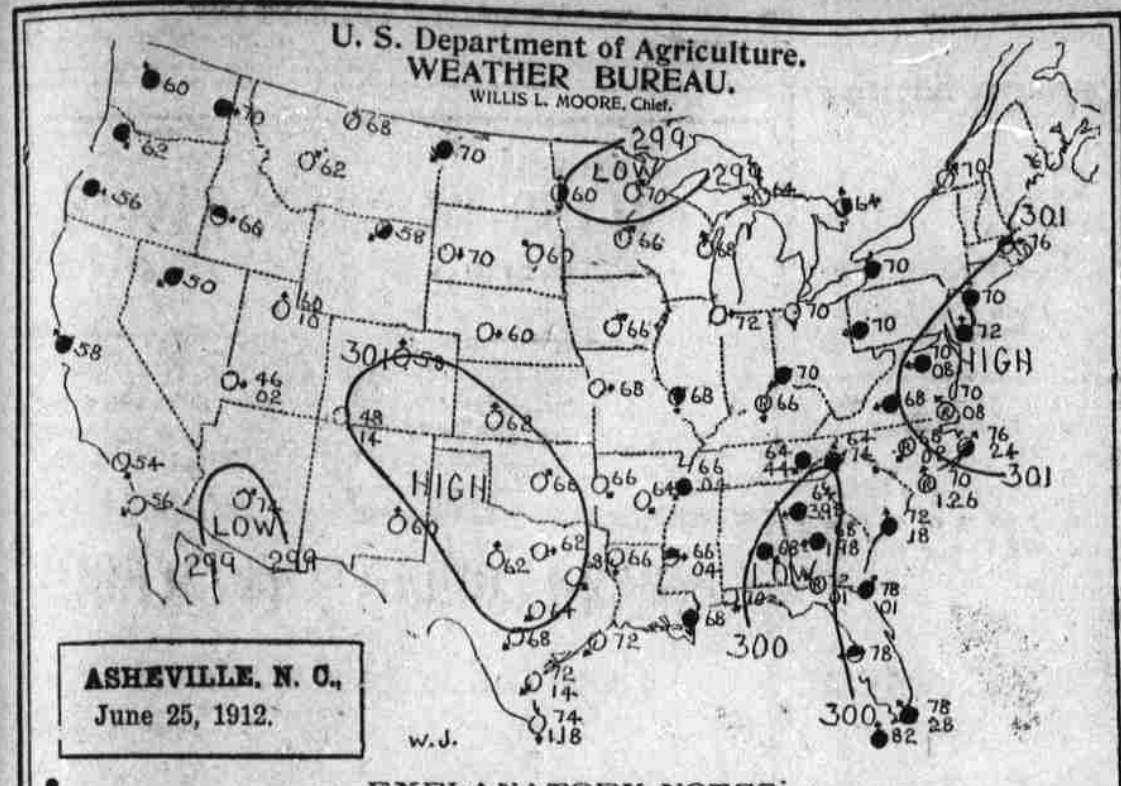
