R. H. Stuton, republican opponent of Mr. Gudger, will make his first speech in Polk county Saturday, although he has been traveling over the district considerably and talking to the voters.

A suggestion has been discussed to the effect that if Mr. Stuton should defeat Mr. Gudger, the latter might contest his election on the ground that Mr. Stuton was not regularly nominated; that is, that he was nominated at a convention which was simply called for the purpose of choosing electors, since nothing was said in the call for the convention about nominating a man for congress.

Major W. W. Rollins will accompany Mr. Stuton to Columbus, Polk county, and also speaks there Saturday at 12 o'clock at the republican county convention.

Mr. Stuton came over to this city from Hendersonville yesterday and during the day did some quiet campaign work among his friends and acquaintances, and could be seen at almost any hour during the afternoon shaking hands and otherwise making himself agreeable. It is understood that his campaign will not include much stump speaking but will be carried on quietly by himself and friends.

He went over to Waynesville today in company with the delegation representing the Greater Western North Carolina association and will take advantage of this occasion to greet his friends in Haywood county.

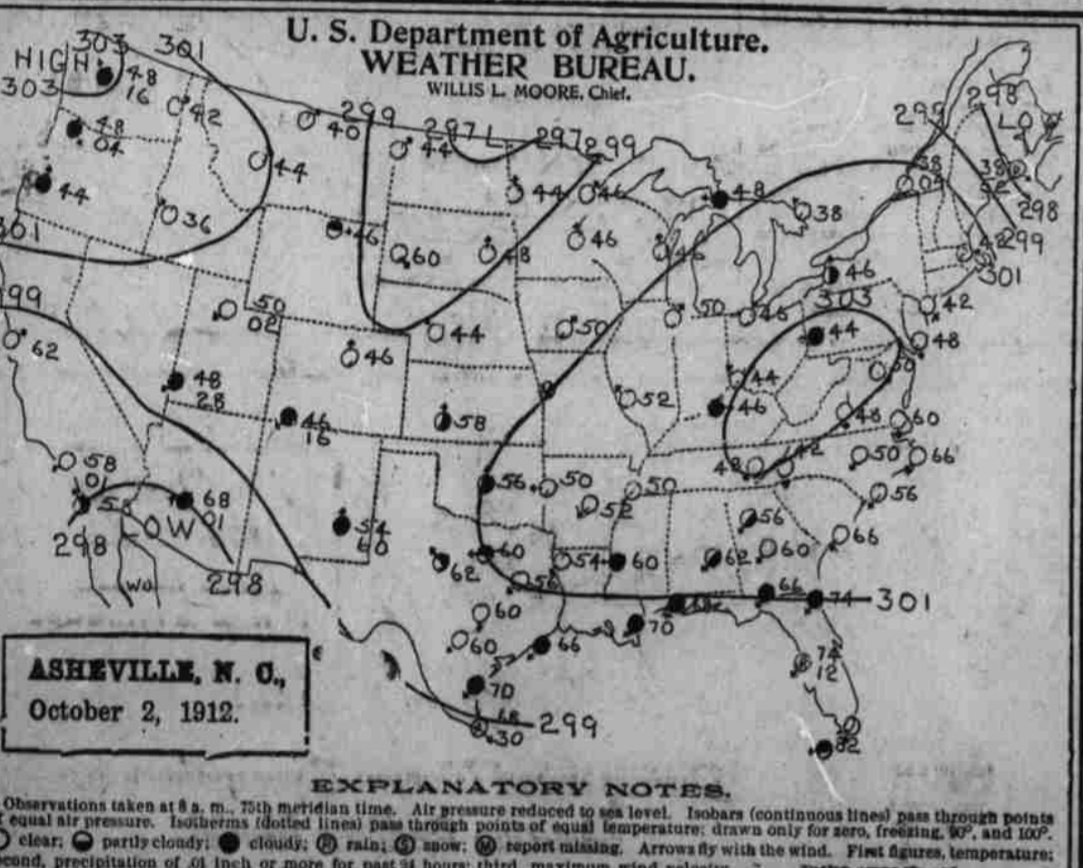
