RESULTS TO DATE ARE MOST PLEASING

Farm Demonstrator Weaver All the Time Enlarging Number of Assistants.

E. D. Weaver, farm demonstrator for Buncombe county, has been engaged in his fall work for several weeks, and stated yesterday that he is very much pleased with the results that he has obtained, so far, and with the prospects for good experimental crops next season. Mr. Weaver has been working in new territory during most of the time this fall and interesting farmers who have not heretofore engaged in the experimental work.

As yet Mr. Weaver has not received many reports from the assistant demonstrators concerning the yields in the experimental tracts but he said yesterday that he is satisfied that the results will be encouraging, as the interest is growing all the time and the number of those who are adopting improved methods is increasing rapidly. He said that there would be a great many more assistant demonstrators next year than ever before. Mr. Weaver is now devoting ten months of the year to his work instead of six months, the time for which he was employed when he was first engaged.

During the past week Mr. Weaver was in the Hominy section. He stated that the farmers there seem glad of an opportunity of helping with the work.

JOHNSON, WHO WAS SHOT, IS NOT EASY TO KILL

Had Been Shot Three Times Before—Is Likely to Get Well—Funeral.

A gentleman from Andrews brought the information today that Ed. Johnson, the barber who was shot at Andrews a few days ago by C. M. Pittman, another barber, is able to walk about and is expected to recover. At first it was thought that he was mortally wounded, as he had a bullet in the back of his head; one in the shoulder and one in the neck. It would appear that Mr. Johnson has as many lives as a cat, as he has been shot three times before this. Pittman, who took to the mountains as soon as he shot Johnson, has not been heard of. There is a reward of \$25 for his apprehension. It is not thought that he will be captured unless he becomes intoxicated and thus gives himself away.

The funeral of Mrs. John W. Walker, who died Sunday at Andrews, takes place today. She was the wife of the cashier of the Merchants and Manufacturers bank and died about a week after giving birth to a son. She was Miss Lena Bushong of Tennessee. The husband and two children survive besides the infant.

Bound to Court for Attempted Criminal Assault—Other Cases Tried.

Lum Bellum, colored, was arraigned in Police court this morning on the charge of attempting to criminally assault Alberta Williams, a little negro girl about 12 years old, and probable cause was found against him. He was held to the February term of Superior court under a bond of \$100.

Hattie Maxwell was before the court charged with the larceny of a diamond ring, the property of Bessie Small, but upon the hearing of the evidence in the case the defendant was discharged.

Dora Price was found guilty of being drunk and disorderly and was fined \$5 and the costs for the offense. Francis Sumner was found not guilty on a charge of being drunk in the city.

In the case of Oscar Wilson, who was fined \$5 and the costs at the session of the court yesterday for driving an automobile on the wrong side of the street, the penalty was remitted, and the defendant withdrew notice of appeal which had been given in open court.

There were no other cases this morning, and the session of the court was very short.

DIES BY GAS

Woman Belonging to Prominent Mississippi Family Commits Suicide in New York.

(By Associated Press.) New York, Oct. 28.—Miss Mary Fontaine Freeland, thought to have been a member of a well known Mississippi family, committed suicide early today in a boarding house in West 55th street by inhaling gas. Her body was found this afternoon.

In the room was an old will with a new codicil in which Miss Freeland disposed of about 18,000 acres of plantation land in Warren county, Miss., and a quantity of jewelry. The will was dated at Port Gibson, Miss., and stated that Miss Freeland was a resident of Warren county.

Near the body were found two cards, one bearing the inscription "River Lee Plantation, Vicksburg, Miss.," and the other with the name "Captain James Perkins, Perkins plantation, Vicksburg."
