**FOR JOLIFICATION AND RATIFICATION**  
Democrats Are Planning to Hold a Big Meeting Next Tuesday Evening.  
**MR. CRAIG WILL ASK**  
**MR. SIMMONS TO COME**  
And Buncombe Democrats Hope to Direct Senator's Attention to Biggest Majority in State.

Democrats heretofore are planning a big meeting for next Tuesday night, one week from the election, for purposes of jolification and ratification. It is proposed to have a torch-light procession, among other things, and if the weather permits the crowd will probably assemble on Pack square and listen to some talks which would be made from the balcony outside the office of Mr. Whitson.  
Governor-elect Craig stated today that he would ask Senator Simmons to be present, and Buncombe democrats hope they will be in position to direct the attention of the senator to the biggest majority which has been given him by any county in the state. Little doubt is felt that Senator Simmons will attend, and it is hoped that a large number of people will be present from near-by counties.  
Will Go to About 1600.  
The majority for Mr. Simmons in Buncombe will be 1600, a few more or less. Mr. Haynes, manager for Mr. Simmons in this section, is confident no other county will make a better showing than this.

**THAT POSTOFFICE, WHO'S TO GET IT?**  
Candidates for the Asheville Place Already Astir—Other Pie on the Table.  
Although the political remains of President Taft and his federal office holders are not yet cold, the good and faithful followers of Mr. Wilson in Asheville are already coming in in force to offer their services to the people in the places that will be vacant early next spring. The local postoffice seems to be the big piece of pie that is to be contended for in Asheville and several candidates for the office are already in the field openly and many more are reported to be ready to come in, or making preparations for their own campaign.  
Foremost among these candidates for the postoffice is John Y. Jordan, as it appears that he has more lines laid for the place than any of the other candidates. He has already circulated a petition among his friends and the citizens of the city and is leaving nothing undone to get a lead that it will be hard for any of his opponents to overcome.  
Another of the candidates who is actively in the race for the office is Forcus Stikeleather. Although Mr. Stikeleather has not gone so far as to circulate a petition, it is understood that he has enlisted the interest of his friends in the matter.  
Among those who are reported to be in the fight so far but whose names as candidates have not been confirmed by actual declarations, are Marcus Erwin and S. G. Bernard.  
For this number of candidates to be in the field within a few hours after the election returns have indicated the election of Mr. Wilson it would seem that the citizens of Asheville are likely to see a local fight that will be almost as interesting as the one just closed between the big factions of the country.  
The postoffice is not the only piece of pie on the local counter, however. The United States marshal and his deputies are in on the "spoils to the victors" principle and will naturally be replaced. One of the government employees in the federal building stated this morning that they are all expecting some action from the democrats that will remove the republicans who are holding their positions through the civil service, and if his fears are realized then all the postoffice clerks and revenue men will be included from the list.  
The republicans in Asheville who are holding government positions have extremely long faces this morning.

**SPEAKERS ARRANGED FOR WEEK OF PRAYER**  
Pastor of the Churches Will Speak at the Y. M. C. A. Each Day During Week.  
The committee appointed yesterday morning by the Asheville Ministers association and composed of Dr. C. W. Lyrd and Ed. B. Brown, for the purpose of arranging speakers for the world wide week of prayer to be held during all of next week at the Y. M. C. A., held a meeting yesterday afternoon and the following speakers, for the days designated, were chosen from among the pastors and acting pastors of the city:  
Rev. W. G. Moody, rector of Episcopal church of Fayetteville and now filling the pulpit of Trinity church here, Monday; Rev. Dr. R. P. Campbell, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Tuesday; Rev. Dr. Calvin B. Waller, pastor of the First Baptist church, Wednesday; Rev. Dr. Charles W. Byrd, pastor of Central Methodist church, Friday; Rev. W. A. Newell, pastor of the Haywood Street Methodist church and president of Weaver-ville college, Saturday.  
These daily meetings will begin each day at 12 o'clock and will last for 35 minutes. The pastors will co-operate in getting a large attendance by inviting the men of their congregations to attend these meetings and it is believed that the series will be the most successful ever held by the local association.

**SCHOOL BONDS CARRIED IT IS TODAY BELIEVED**  
They Carry Unless It Is Found That There Are as Many as 2680 Qualified Voters.  
There seems to be no question that the bond issue of \$50,000 for the permanent improvement of the city schools that was voted on yesterday in the six precincts of the city has carried. The returns show that the votes cast for the issue total up to 1240. It is not known exactly how many registered voters there are in Asheville at present but when the books were inspected in June, 1911, the number was less than 1900. There is no likelihood that the number has increased in a year and a half to nearly 2700, what it would have to be in order to defeat the issue.  
All that remains now to determine fully whether or not the issue has carried is for the registration books to be purged by the board of canvassers, composed of one man from each precinct, and if the books show less than 2680 qualified voters in the city the bonds will be issued. Supt. H. J. Tiche of the city schools stated this morning that he is confident that the bonds are assured.  
This issue was voted on in the last municipal election held in May, 1911, and at that time only between 800 and 900 votes were cast for it. As every qualified vote in the city that is not cast for the issue is counted against it, the issue was lost.
