HELD FOR MURDER

Wealthy Lithuanian Nobleman Accused of Killing Prince Lubeski Last Week.

Warsaw, Russia, April 30.—An extraordinary sensation was caused here today by the arrest of Baron John Bisping, one of the wealthiest landlords of Lithuania, on the charge of murdering Prince Ladislas Drucki Lubeski, a relative by marriage, whose body was found pierced with two bullet wounds on April 22 in the park adjoining his residence at Teresin, near Warsaw.

Prince Ladislas was a well known Polish nobleman and president of the Automobile club of Warsaw. He left his house on April 22 with Baron Bisping for the railway station. When the prince did not return a search was made and his body was found in the park with his carriage and horses standing nearby.

MARY ANN DEAD

Creator of the Ham and Egg Sandwich Passes Away at Chicago.

Chicago, April 30.—Mrs. Mary Ann Ingham, said to have been the creator of the ham and egg sandwich, and known to students at the University of Chicago merely as "Mary Ann," died today. Twenty years ago she established a small restaurant in one corner of the university athletic field.

She knew every athlete who was in training and always refused to sell pies to those who were trying to make the varsity teams.

New Baggage Rules Go Into Effect.

By Associated Press. Chicago, April 30.—Forty-five inches is the longest trunk that may be carried as free baggage on railroads in the United States after today. The new rules from the trunk with bottom, or bottom, designed so that it must stand in a certain position, so the gowns and hats inside will travel right side up. It may be some time, however, before the "freak" trunks can be refused. Notice is required in order to reject them lawfully. Five pounds for each inch over forty-five inches is the rate of excess charge that will be levied under the new baggage rule.

Testifies at Tobacco Hearing.

BY Associated Press. Washington, April 30.—Competition is no stronger to foreign government buying American tobacco, according to W. G. Dunnington, buyer for the Italian government, who testified today before the joint congressional tobacco committee. Until about three years ago, Mr. Dunnington was also a buyer for the Austrian government.

Tobacco is cheaper now on warehouse floors than it was three years ago, Mr. Dunnington said, but he was unable to give any explanation for the decrease in price. He expressed the opinion that the character of the crops did not account for it.
