EMMA McINTYRE AND LON SMITH CONVICTED

L. M. Payne Up on Two Charges—Two Speeders Fined—Other Cases.

Lon Smith and Emma McIntyre were convicted in Police court this morning of disorderly conduct of a serious nature. The former was sentenced to the county roads for a term of six months and appealed. His appearance bond was fixed at \$300. The McIntyre woman was given two months in the county jail. She gave notice of appeal but this was later withdrawn.

L. M. Payne was before the court on two charges, being drunk in the city and driving an automobile while intoxicated. On the latter charge he was fined \$40 and the costs, while a noel prosee was entered in the other. Obsey Bailey was also before the court on two charges. Convicted of vagrancy, he was sentenced to the county roads for 30 days; while a noel prosee was entered in the case charging him with throwing missiles in a public street.

Henry Copening was given a hearing this morning on the charge of stealing a suit of clothes valued at \$15, from E. L. Moss, and was found not guilty.

The sentence of 30 days on the county roads, entered yesterday morning against Burgin Johnson for an assault on Arthur Gudge, was changed this morning to a fine of \$20 and the costs.

L. C. Wilson and J. M. Chiles were found guilty of exceeding the speed limit with automobiles and were fined \$5 and the costs each.

Lillie Melton was fined \$5 and the costs for being drunk.

PLANS FOR NEW HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN MATURING

Organization Has Taken Permanent Quarters in Mears Building.

The plans are slowly and surely maturing in connection with the recently launched enterprise for raising \$100,000 for a new hospital for Buncombe county. Chairman S. Lipinsky is counseling with the officers and others interested in the formation of the sub-committees, which will have in charge the various phases of the preliminary work during July. A number of these committees are partially filled and are quietly getting under way with their part of the work, and it is expected that an announcement of the complete campaign executive committee and its sub-committees will be made at the meeting next Monday evening, to be held in the court house at 8:30 o'clock.

Through the courtesy of the Emmanuel Business college the committee started its work in one of their rooms, and the headquarters on the second floor of the Mears building, 17 South Main street, were occupied and the office paraphernalia and telephone installed. Telephone call at the new headquarters will be 3090.

A regular meeting of the Mission Hospital board of managers was held this morning at 10:30 a. m., at which time Chairman Lipinsky and Campaign Director Hoffsommer were present, and conferred with the ladies concerning the 10 days campaign. The meeting was unusually interesting. The details of the preparatory work for the coming campaign were carefully considered, and the women are taking hold aggressively in the formation of their canvassing organization. Much enthusiasm was manifest, and while the campaign directors suggest the advisability of having 15 teams of 10 ladies each, the probabilities are that there will be more than that number. Emphasis was laid on the fact that this huge undertaking is a matter of interest to every one in the community, rich and poor; an dit is anticipated that workers will be secured from all walks of life in the community.

TROOP OF U. S. CAVALRY TO COME FOR THE FAIR

Captain Robert B. Reynolds of Troop B cavalry has received a message from Secretary of War Garrison in which he indicated that he would give permission for Troop K. U. S. A., to come here during the fair if Governor Craik thinks it advisable for the troop to visit this section, saying that he could not send the troop here without the recommendation of the governor.

Captain Reynolds has consulted Governor Craig, who made the recommendation desired and the secretary of war has been so advised. The troop is the crack riding troop of the eleventh cavalry. It is stationed at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., commanded by Captain Eben Swift, Jr., who is said to be one of the best horsemen in the service; and he will give riding exhibitions here. The troop is now maneuvering at Winchester, Va., and will leave there September 20, en route to Asheville.

He wove numbers of strong arguments into his speech, which was regarded by those hearing him as an interesting and instructive appeal.
