POLICE COURT

SOUTHERN PASSENGER MEN ASSIGNED DUTIES

Stationed at Various Points in W. N. C. to Assist in Handling Tourists.

Four Southern railway passenger men from various points of the system reported here this morning for duty during the summer season at points in western North Carolina and have been sent out by Division Passenger Agent J. H. Wood. These men are the points to which they are assigned are as follows:

A., of Washington, will report here on August 14 and will be stationed at the passenger depot ticket office in Asheville.

Every effort is made to handle these tourists expeditiously and to make their very convenient and comfortable when their trips are well up to the top of the season. The extra men will be kept here until September 28.

GOMEZ TAKES THE FIELD AGAINST EX-DICTATOR

Venezuela's President to Command Forces Operating Against General Castro.

Caracas, Aug. 4.—President Juan Falcón Gómez orders to take possession of the Venezuelan army and to fight against the ex-dictator. Gómez's forces have taken the provinces of Falcon and Trujillo, and also in the eastern districts of Venezuela. The president issued the following proclamation today:

"Castro, the former dictator, having deserted the post of the country, I myself will take the field and will establish order. I know that every general officer and soldier will follow me."

Although business here has come to a standstill and stock values have gone down, the people express confidence that the government will be able to suppress the rebellion.

Mobilizing Armies. An army of veterans and some thousands of recruits is being mobilized at the town of Maracay, 20 miles southwest of the Venezuelan capital. These forces are expected to attack Castro in the state of Falcon and drive out Ulpiano Castro. They will proceed there in two divisions by land and sea.
