Ten Block Streets Are Jammed as Funeral Procession of 25,000

BY NOW RESTS IN GREENWOOD CEMETERY

Funeral Service Is Said at Trinity Church—Business Partly Suspended in New York

By Associated Press. New York, Sept. 22.—The body of William Jay Gaynor, late mayor of New York city, was taken at 10:30 o'clock this morning from its resting place in the city hall to Trinity church, where Bishop Greer read over the solemn Episcopal service of the rite of the dead.

A standing array of citizens, many thousands strong—greater in number than any funeral which had passed on the body of a lay man in state yesterday—packed the sidewalks from curb to curb along the sidewalks from curb to curb.

With the coffin and the casket draped over its head, the coffin lay 10 feet above the roadway upon a catafalque whose member fields of white, were as smooth as silk.

Sixteen men in black, some with black turbans, flanked on the right by a group of police and on the left by a group of police.

RAPID PROGRESS WITH TARIFF BILL

Disputed Points Narrow to Main Features—House May Get Bill Thursday.

By Associated Press. Washington, Sept. 22.—Disputed points between the senate and the house in the tariff bill, narrowed down today to such chief features as the income tax, the tax on cotton futures and the general administrative provisions.

Chairman Simmons said he expected the bill to be ready for his signature before the end of the week. The last moments of the passage of a tariff measure, however, always offer opportunity for rejection of the conference report and further deliberation on points upon which either house may dissent.

With consideration of the income tax section today, the senate's amendment lowering the minimum exemption for dependent wives and children and larger taxes on great incomes came up for settlement.

President Wilson today called upon the congressmen with leaders to believe all differences would be smoothed out and he would sign the bill this week.
