HOMES ROBBED IN WEST ASHEVILLE

Houses of John Weaver, A. B. Bishop and Geo. Knuckles Entered Last Night.

MONEY, VALUABLES TAKEN FROM EACH

Same Methods of Entrance Used in Each Case—Officers Have No Clue.

Between the hours of 2 and 5 o'clock yesterday, the homes of John Weaver, A. B. Bishop and George Knuckles, in West Asheville, were entered and robbed by unknown parties, and money and valuables were taken from each.

The home of Mr. Weaver was entered about 2 o'clock. The robbers prized open a rear window, and secured about \$20; and from there they evidently went to the home of Mr. Bishop, where they effected an entrance through the kitchen window.

The last house entered was that of Mr. Knuckles—he thinks about 5 o'clock. The robbers took an axe belonging to a neighbor and forced an entrance through the dining room window, afterwards entering his room and robbing him of about \$5, which was in his trousers near the bed.

There seems to be no clue, whatever, as no one saw the parties, nor were any suspicious characters seen around the streets last night. However, the county officials will make thorough investigations.
