GOOD ROADS MEN ENDORSE A. P. A.

Apply for Associate Membership, Also—"Good Roads Days" Are Considered.

At a special meeting of the Asheville and Buncombe County Good Roads association yesterday afternoon, resolutions were adopted endorsing the Appalachian Park association, which was recently organized here with Governor Locke Craig as president and George S. Lowell as secretary. Application was also made for associate membership in the association. The resolutions adopted follow:

"Whereas, The Appalachian Park association, recently formed here with Governor Locke Craig as president, is seeking to have the Appalachian forest reservation made available to the people for recreation, pleasure and health, and

"Whereas, This purpose, if carried out, will not only be local, but national, in its benefits, turning part of this beautiful region into those use which will be of the greatest benefit to the nation; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Good Roads association of Asheville and Buncombe county gives its cordial support to the Appalachian Park association and hereby makes application for associate membership in same."

The meeting was called primarily for the consideration of this matter, but following its disposition those present discussed plans for observing Governor Craig's "good roads days," November 5 and 6. All present pledged themselves to do active work during these two days or employ workmen for the time. No definite action was taken as to where their efforts are to be extended, although it is probable that improvements will be made on Sunset drive from the end of the car line to the mountain.

Before adjournment was taken the secretary of the association was instructed to write a letter of thanks to the owners and management of Grove Park Inn for the hospitality shown to visiting delegates to the Southern Appalachian Good Roads association convention, which was held here last week. One of the most enjoyable social events tendered for the visitors was the dinner given on Wednesday evening, October 22, when the delegates were special guests of the Inn.

BIG APPLE SHIPMENTS FROM BLACK MOUNTAIN

About 1000 Bushels of Limber-swigs Shipped During Present Week.

Although there is a very marked scarcity in the western North Carolina apple crop this year, a visitor to Asheville from Black Mountain brings the news that the apple market in that town has been very active this week, approximately 1000 bushels having been shipped to out-of-town purchasers. The bulk of these apples were Limbertwigs and went to E. F. White of Charlotte and Concord.

Of the 1000 bushels shipped, 400 bushels were taken from the orchard of L. L. Dougherty, and about 600 bushels came from the orchard of Alfred Stevenson. It is stated that there are a number of large orchards that have not yet been touched and that the further shipments before the end of the season will be considerable.

All boys participating in the basketball league are required to attend them. Music will be furnished by the Boys' orchestra and there will be singing by a quartet of boys, composed of Kendrick Coachman, Ed. Geler, Oscar Steele and Charles Tennent.

A NEW BOYS' SCHOOL FOR HENDERSONVILLE

Will Open Next Year at Old Mountain View Lodge.

Announcement is made to the effect that the town of Hendersonville is to have another school next year. This is to be an institution for boys and will be conducted by Prof. J. R. Sandifer and A. H. Randolph, who have recently purchased the Mountain View lodge property for the purposes of the school. This property is situated on the Edgewood road about a half mile from Hendersonville, and there is a large building there already. A good deal of improvement work will be done on it to convert it into a modern school building.

Prof. Sandifer was at one time connected with an important school at Woodbury Forest, Va., and has been lately identified with the schools of Charlotte. Mr. Randolph, his brother-in-law, has been superintendent of the schools at Monroe for several years. Both are said to be highly trained teachers, and the people of Hendersonville will likely be much benefited by the establishment of the new school there.
