Virginia Concern Contemplates Such Development In Madison County.

Capital is Also Interested in Potter; Quartz and Iron Ores of That County.

There is immediate prospect of a There is immediate prospect of a big development of a natural lime-stone deposit in Madison county by a Virginia concern. The head of this concern has visited the deposit and has made a thorough investigation into the possibility of the development, and he is well pleased with the prospects. He has given assurances that he will erect a plant that will have a capacity of 250 tons of lime daily, and it is expected that the construction work will begin during the winter months.

This man has had a life-long ex perience in the lime industry and has all the money necessary for the de-velopment. From his personal investigation of the deposit, and from an-alysis made of the limestone, he says that it is one of the highest grade deposits to be found anywhere. His company now operates the biggest lime plant in the state of Virginia. His name is withheld, for the present. on request.

The probable development of this natural deposit of limestone has been brought the work of the land and industrial department of the Southern railway, the investigation having beer begun by Col. T. Gilbert Wood, local agent of the department. J. H.
