FORE HEARING IS NOW IN PROGRESS

Young White Men Charged With Violating the Mann White Slave Law.

A preliminary hearing in the case against Fred Fore, charged with violating the Mann white slave law, is being held this afternoon before United States Commissioner R. S. McCall. The case was called at 1:30 o'clock and will be continued after several of the witnesses are examined, owing to the fact that other witnesses are absent. Paralee Ledford, Lillie Edmonds and Martha J. Lindsey, witnesses for the government, were examined this afternoon. The Ledford girl testified that she is 17 years old and that during the exposition in Knoxville Fred Fore bought tickets for Lillie Edmonds and herself to go to Knoxville for immoral purposes; that upon arriving in Knoxville they were taken to a disorderly house and that the Edmonds woman returned to Asheville the next day. She testified further that she stayed in the house nearly two weeks before she could get money enough to return here. She went on to say that she met a man at the exposition who paid her money to Asheville and she returned home. She said that Fore visited her in the house in Knoxville and that she begged him to return her to this city and that he always said that he did not have the money.

Her testimony was corroborated by the Edmonds woman.

It is not known just what defense Fore will offer, as his witnesses will not be put on the stand until late this afternoon.

Fore was arrested several weeks ago, warrants being sworn out against him by the Knoxville white slave officer and by the Asheville officer. He was on the Buncombe county chain-gang at the time the warrants were sworn out but was released on habeas corpus proceedings and arrested by a United States marshal the next day, and since then has been confined in the state jail.

This is the first case of a violation of the Mann white slave law in the state and one of the three in the south.

PROGRESS IN WORK ON TRYON-SALUDA HIGHWAY

W. G. PENLAND RECOVERS OF SOUTHERN RAILWAY

Contractor is Working Force of 110 Men and 25 Teams

According to a Compromise Judgment, Plaintiff Gets \$1750—Another Suit.

According to information received here from Polk county, work on the highway between Tryon and Saluda is progressing very rapidly. This road is being built by C. D. Geer on contract, and at the present time he is working a force of 110 men and 25 teams. Between 200 and 300 yards of dirt are being moved daily.

This road is nine miles long and when completed will be one of the finest in western North Carolina, forming a very important link in the Asheville-Spartanburg highway. A good grade will be had along the entire route and cuts are being made now from six to 11 feet deep in order to secure the best grades.

Several business houses in Tryon, which are situated on the main street, are now changing elevations to comply with the new grade of the road.

BOOKER MAXWELL HELD ON SHOOTING CHARGE

Sheriff Williams Brings Alleged Assailant of Hunter From Jacksonville.

Sheriff C. F. Williams returned yesterday afternoon from Jacksonville with the negro, Booker Maxwell, who is alleged to have shot Will (Sun) Hunter, colored, here about a month ago. Sheriff Williams received a message from the sheriff at Jacksonville Saturday saying that Maxwell was there in jail and would return here without requisition papers, and the sheriff left the same afternoon to bring the prisoner back. Sheriff Williams says that he had no trouble with Maxwell at all on the trip back and he is now in the county jail, where he will remain without bail until Hunter is able to appear in court. At the Mission hospital this morning it was stated that Hunter's condition was unchanced and as he has been in a serious condition for some time, being partly paralyzed on his right side, it is not known whether he has a chance to recover or not.

PROSPECT OF STRIKE SETTLEMENT IS GOOD

London, Dec. 8.—The prospect of a strike of 100,000 employees of the British postoffice during the Christmas season increases daily. A national committee of the employees unions will meet this week to decide the question. The general sentiment among the men appears to be in favor of giving Herbert Samuel, the postmaster general, an ultimatum immediately demanding a 15 per cent increase of salary for all employees.

The march on the White House was caused principally by President Wilson's omission in his annual message of any reference to the suffrage question. Last week the president was suffering from a bad cold and could not see the suffragists, and after two attempts to make an engagement the suffrage leaders were instructed to wait in Washington until Mr. Wilson could see them.

The White House engagement list was cleared for the reception of the women.

Welcome Mrs. Pankhurst.

London, Dec. 8.—Militant suffragettes gathered in force to welcome Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst on her arrival from Exeter. She was released from the Exeter jail last night. Although an ambulance and a stretcher were taken to the station, they were not needed, as Mrs. Pankhurst was able to alight from the train with the assistance of a nurse and another companion.

She looked very weak and wended her way with tottering steps from the train to a carriage. She was taken to a nursing home at the head of a long procession of taxicabs containing her cheering supporters.

Killing Accidental.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 7.—The killing of Robert Marshall, chief of a club here, who was shot by Thomas H. Peoples, attorney general of South Carolina, was declared an accident by the coroner's jury, which rendered its verdict last night. Following the verdict the coroner released Mr. Peoples on his own recognizance.
