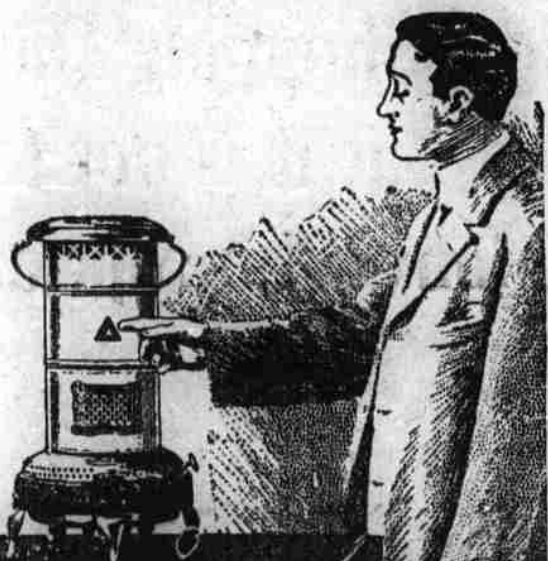

CUBAN WOMEN WANT SUFFRAGE PRIVILEGE

New York, Dec. 20.—Cuban women want the vote and are organizing, according to a letter received here by Mrs. Raymond Brown, president of the New York State Suffrage association, who is asked to lend her name to the movement by becoming honorary president.

"We have raised the banner of suffrage here with the name 'Partido Popular Feminista' with ideas of equality in the relation of the sex and with peaceful intentions and legal procedure," the letter says. The letter is dated from Havana and is signed "Emelia Perez Mooney."

BOXING LAW RESULTS IN \$110,000 OF TAXES

New York, Dec. 20.—The annual report of the State athletic commission will show that since the boxing law went into effect in August 1911, about \$110,000 has been paid into the state comptroller's office, this money being the amount of five per cent tax on the gross receipts of all licensed operating under the statute. There has been a falling off in receipts during the last year, due probably to the poor quality of many so-called star bouts.

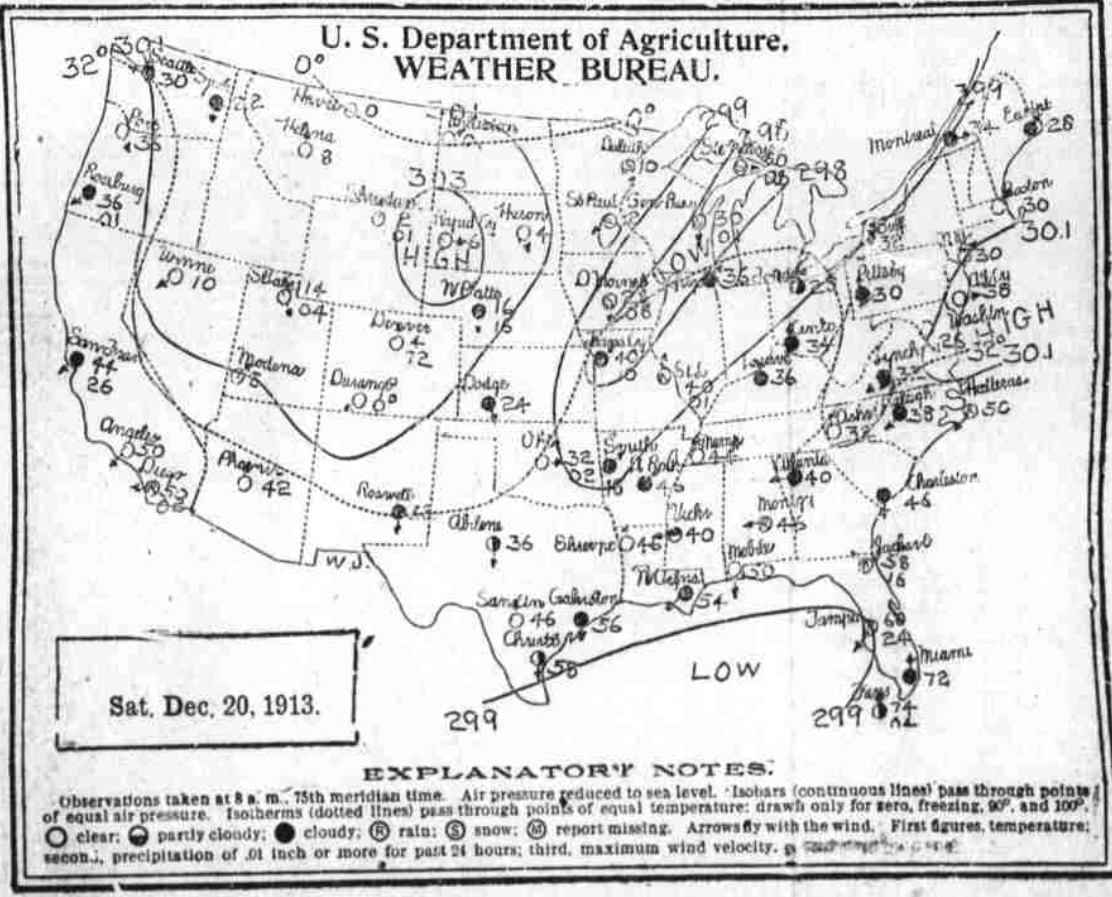

Norfolk, Va., Dec. 20.—In an action for \$200,000 by the Richmond Cedar works against the John L. Roper Lumber company, a jury here gave a verdict in favor of the defendant holding the John L. Roper Lumber company not liable for certain heavy losses sustained by the Richmond Cedar works in the Dismal swamp section. It was averred that the fires were caused by sparks from the defendant company's engines. The trial had been on for 10 days.
