His favorite shot for pheasants is No. 8 chilled. Schulze powder, and pegamoid shells. Later in the season he uses No. 7 chilled shot, but never larger than the last number.

THE COLOMBIAN PANAMA QUARREL

Negotiations are now on foot between the United States and Colombia for a settlement of the controversy growing out of the Panama revolution through which the United States acquired the right to build the canal. The Taft administration sought to settle the whole matter by offering Colombia a salvo to her wounded feeling by payment of \$10,000,000 and by several other propositions. But Colombia would have nothing to do with these negotiations, saying that she preferred to wait and settle with the Wilson administration.

Opinions widely differ as to the recititude of our course in the Panama-Colombian revolution. Some assert that it was a conspiracy to despoil Colombia of her property, territory, and rights. Others assert that Colombia got just what was coming to her, that she attempted to rob the New Panama Canal company of its rights and that it was simply a case of the "biter bitten."

CHINA CALLED THE LAND OF OPPORTUNITY Haverhill, Mass., Jan. 30.—"A great change has come over China and the Chinese," declares the Rev. Clarence A. Burch, a missionary who has just returned from the Orient. "China, from President Yuan Shih-kai to the humblest toiler of the street, now looks to the foreigner, and especially the American, for help. They ask us about our government, about our methods of sanitation and many other items that are for the welfare of the nation. There are, in China, many hundreds of broken idols that will never be repaired and right here is a challenge to Christianity. They are open-hearted and open-minded and think well of their Christian friends from America. There are opportunities in that country for all kinds of teachers, engineers and all the various trades; and there is a great opportunity for Christianity."

The Best Way To Plant SWEET PEAS is to dig a trench one foot deep and one foot wide, removing the earth to one side. At the bottom place two inches of rich manure and cover with three inches of good soil. Then sow the peas one inch apart and cover with three inches of soil and firm with the feet.
