Virginia's southpaw hurler did consistent flinging throughout the entire matinee, never once during the performance being in any difficulty, and the sturly lads from Chapel Hill found Gammon's service almost impossible to solve.

An enthusiastic gathering of 3500 frantic rooters witnessed the afternoon's entertainment, the greater number of them sporting the pale blue and white of the Old North State, while a sprinkling who still hold allegiance to the Old Dominion carried the orange and blue. At every opportunity, whether the feat of the player was especially worthy of notice, or merely of the ordinary variety, the followers of the schools made the stands rock with volleys of thunderous applause.
