

OWNER UNKNOWN OF HANDSOME RAPIER

Pennsylvania Man Has Relic He Thinks Belongs to N. Carolina Soldier.

Just now as the war clouds are thickening over the United States and Mexico and the past is forgotten for the moment in contemplation of the developments of the present situation, there comes a faint whisper of that terrible conflict of the states of 59 years ago.

Congressman James M. Gudger, Jr., is in receipt of a letter from Capt. Jedediah C. Paine of Shawnee, Pa., formerly attached to Gen. Hancock's staff, who now has in his possession a rapier that he took from the field of battle at Williamsburg, Va., on the afternoon of May 5, 1862, and which he thinks was the possession of an officer of some North Carolina regiment. He is making an attempt to find the owner, or descendants of the owner, of this relic. His letter to Congressman Gudger, which is self explanatory, follows:

"Immediately after the close of the engagement at Williamsburg, Va., on the afternoon of May 5, 1862, I picked up from off the field where Early made his assault, a handsome sword of the rapier pattern with belt attached, that had evidently been hastily removed from some badly wounded officer. The scabbard shows indications of two glancing bullet marks, and the relic has all the earmarks of a much older period than the civil war, and should be easily identified by the owner, if he survives the engagement, or by some member of his family.

"It is possible he may have been an officer of the Fifth North Carolina, which was one of the regiments of Early's brigade, and it has occurred to me that if that regiment was organized in your congressional district you might be able to suggest some way the matter could be brought to the attention of an interested party, and thereby assist me in having the sword returned to the owner or his family, who no doubt would prize it very highly."

Congressman Gudger has authorized the publication of this letter in the hope that it may serve as a means of restoring the relic to its rightful owner.

A FISH HATCHERY FOR THIS SECTION

Gudger Introduces Bill Carrying \$50,000 Appropriation For Hatchery Here.

Congressman James M. Gudger, Jr. has introduced a bill in the national house of representatives to have a fish hatching and fish culture station established in the Tenth Congressional district of North Carolina and that the sum of \$50,000 be appropriated for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the bill. The bill is as follows:

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, That the sum of \$50,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the establishment of a fish-hatching and fish-culture station within the Tenth Congressional district of the state of North Carolina, including purchase of site, construction of building and ponds, and equipment, at some suitable point in said congressional district to be selected by the United States commissioner of fish and fisheries and the said commissioner is hereby authorized and directed to establish said station as provided herein."

The introduction of this bill followed the introduction of one by Mr. Falson of the committee on the merchant marine and fisheries to establish such stations in Alabama, Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Indiana, Illinois, Maryland, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Oklahoma, Texas, South Carolina, Massachusetts and Washington, an appropriation of \$50,000 to go for the establishment of each station. The only provision in the bill that must be complied with by the various states is that they authorize the United States commissioner and his agents to conduct the stations in any manner that may seem best to them.

The establishment of a hatchery in this section has long been considered a matter of importance, and it would seem especially appropriate at this time, since the Federal government has already expended large sums in the purchase of forest areas in western North Carolina and proposes to extend still greater funds for this purpose.
