JUDGE MERRIMON NOW IN THE RACE

Makes Formal Announcement
Today of His Congressional
Candidacy in the 10th.

Judge James H. Merrimon of this city today makes formal announcement through the columns of The Gazette-News that he will be a candidate before the democratic congressional convention of the Tenth North Carolina district for nomination, and that the voters of Buncombe and Haywood counties, as well as those of the remaining 11 counties in the district which hold primaries, will be given an opportunity to cast their ballots for him in these primaries. He states in his announcement that he will not be able to carry on an active personal campaign, as he has obligations that will consume all his time until July 1, but that he is confident that his friends will look after his interests. Judge Merrimon does not claim to have qualifications above others in the race, or above others who may enter the race, but states that he enters simply because he is qualified for the position and is following out a constitutional right. He points to his record of 45 years as a democrat and says that he has always stood staunchly by the democratic standard, through success and adversity. He gives his endorsement to the Wilson administration.

POSTAL CO. WINS SUIT AGAINST WESTERN UNION

Latter Must Transmit Mes-
sages For Former at Regu-
lar Tolls.

Special to The Gazette-News. Albany, N. Y., April 29.—The Court of Appeals has affirmed an order of the appellate division, which in turn affirmed an order of the public service commission at Albany commanding the Western Union Telegraph company to cease charging the Postal Telegraph Cable company an extra sum in addition to the regular telegraph tolls on telegrams taken in and transmitted part way by the Postal and then handed over en route by the Postal to the Western Union for further transmission, and delivery at exclusive Western Union points. This litigation between the two companies has been going on for about four years. There were various hearings before the public service commission, and the final decision of the commission was given in favor of the Postal company. Thereupon, the Western Union took the matter into the appellate division of the Supreme court which affirmed the decision of the public service commission. The Court of Appeals now affirms all this and henceforth the Western Union will be allowed to charge only the full local tolls on messages taken in by the Postal company and directed to points reached by the Western Union and not reached by the Postal.

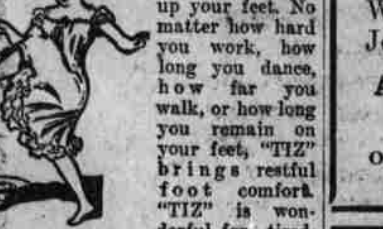
