

# ASHEVILLE SINKS TO LOWER LEVEL

## Walloped Again by Patriots— Capitals and Hornets Win Fast Contests.

Greensboro, May 12.—By the ability to hit the ball and the excellent fielding, the Patriots yesterday afternoon defeated the Mountaineers in the second game of the series by the score of 6 to 3. The work of the locals was brilliant throughout the contest and especially good was the work of Crane the local shortstop, who got six chances, each hard ones, and accepted every one.

Two pitchers were used by both sides during the contest, Asheville opening with Smith, who was relieved in the third when the locals got three runs off his delivery, and Watson took his place. Although Watson allowed three runs after he got on the mound, he was able to hold the locals down after the fourth to no runs. Miller, for the locals, was relieved in the seventh, after he had given free passes to the first two men and allowed two hits which scored two runs.

One of the features of the game was the homer in the second made by Whitted, when he landed the ball over the right field fence for a trip all the way round. Although the Mountaineers were able to get seven hits, the work of the local fielders kept them from making but three scores of them. Cook and Welch, out of three times at bat, secured two hits each, leading the Mountaineers in the hitting line.

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## SAYS JOURNALISM IS AS SACRED AS MINISTRY

Lawrence, Kas., May 13.—The newspaper profession is as sacred a calling as the ministry in the opinion of Dr. Washington Gladden, of Columbus, Ohio, as expressed in an address made before hundreds of newspaper men here yesterday at national conference being conducted by the University of Kansas.

Other speakers on today's program were H. F. Harrington, of the Ohio State Journal, and Will Irwin, a magazine writer. A paper by Frank B.

Noyes, of Washington, D. C., president of the Associated Press, on press association work was read.

Dr. Gladden decried what he referred to as a tendency of some newspapers toward "habits of exaggeration" and the exploitation of crime, vice and scandal. He outlined four great tasks for American journalism: First, to teach people to avoid exaggeration and violent speech.

Second, to resist the tendencies which demoralize democracy and which substitute the mob mind for the deliberate habit.

Third, to hold the popular judgment firmly to the truth that character and

manhood and not money and popularity are the central values of human existence.

Fourth, to turn the thoughts of men more and more from the negative virtue of detecting and exposing the evil to the positive virtue of discerning and praising the good.

GEO. G. BRUCE, BUILDER OF FLA. EAST COAST RY. DIES

Maltimore, May 13.—George S. Bruce, prominent civil engineer and builder of the Florida East Coast railway, died at a hospital here yesterday.

Mr. Bruce had been at the hospital

for some time undergoing treatment for an injury of the foot which occurred in Tennessee while he was doing some engineering work there. He was 62 years old.
