Dictator May Depart Today

Huerta and Minister Blanquet Expected to Follow Their Families From Capital To Vera Cruz.

SOME THINK HE MAY MAKE STAND, HOWEVER

Efforts at Washington Directed Toward Averting Fighting and Bloodshed in Mexican Capital.

Washington, July 15.—No word of the movements or intentions of General Huerta was contained in the early official advices from Mexico City today. The only official communication was a message from the Mexican legation there, the contents of which had evidently been censored, until nothing but a mere list of routine formal announcements remained.

Washington, July 15.—With Huerta's family and several close friends in flight today from Mexico City, the immediate resignation of the dictator was expected by the state department and members of the diplomatic corps in Washington. Dispatches from Mexico City stated that Huerta and his minister of war, General Blanquet, might follow their families from the capital to Vera Cruz, sometime today.

NEW HAVEN SHARES GOES DOWN TO 51%

New York, July 15.—Fresh liquidation in New York, New Haven and Hartford, sent that stock to a new low record on the stock exchange today. By noon it had fallen on heavy offerings to 51%, an over night loss of 15%.

THE FEDERALS QUIT GUAYMAS

Evacuation of Port Is Begun, While Conferences and the Exchange of Prisoners Continue.

FEDERALS EXPECTED TO SUPPORT CARRANZA

Villa at Juarez Will Probably Move Army Toward Mexico City Within the Next Eight Days.

On Board U. S. California, Mazatlan, Mexico, July 14.—(Via San Diego Cal., July 15.)—Evacuation of Guaymas by the Mexican federalists was begun today with the arrival of the steamer Benito Juarez, according to reports made to Rear Admiral Howard.

Conferences between federal and constitutionalist generals at Guaymas, relative to the exchange of prisoners continued throughout the day and the negotiations have practically been completed, the federals claiming the right to certain exceptions when the transfers are made.

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GUDGER DENIES CHARGES MADE

Congressman Issues Statement Denying All Knowledge of Suit Against Robert R. Reynolds.

ATTACKS REYNOLDS' EXPENSE STATEMENT

Says Hotel Bills at Waynesville Were Not Certified to Congress—Congressman's Statement.

Congressman James M. Gudger, Jr. is in the city today for the first time since the story appeared in The Gazette-News Monday relative to a suit instituted by Mrs. L. K. Cameron, proprietress of the Suyeta Park hotel, Waynesville, against Robert R. Reynolds, candidate for congress against Mr. Gudger, for a delegation board bill.

Mr. Gudger denies flatly in the beginning that he knew anything of the suit before the action was announced publicly and follows this with the charge that Mr. Reynolds did not include the amounts paid out at Waynesville as a delegation hotel bill in his itemized statement of campaign expenses to the clerk of the house of representatives as required by law.

HACKETT FAVORS PRIMARY REFORM

Says Statewide Primary Law Will Make Wilkes County Democratic.

Charleston, W. Va., July 15.—The Kanawha valley was swept last night and today by storms doing damage estimated at \$250,000. The Masonic temple in Charleston was damaged to the extent of \$25,000 by lightning.

BAVARIA PUTS BAN ON TRUST CIGARETTES

Munich, Germany, July 15.—The Bavarian war ministry today ordered all branches of the Bavarian army including officers' messes and men's canteens, to purchase cigarettes only from firms independent of the tobacco trust. The trust cigarettes already had been barred from Bavarian railway stations.

MEN PREPARING AN ULTIMATUM

Relations Between Enginemen And 98 Western Railroads Has Reached the Breaking Point.

EMPLOYES FIRMLY STAND FOR DEMANDS

Disasterous Strike Is Imminent Unless Demands Are Modified, Says Operators' Committee.

Chicago, July 15.—Relation between the enginemen of railroads west of Chicago and the operators' committee reached the breaking point today. The men's representatives prepared a final ultimatum on wages and working conditions, but the managers' committee already had declared that the demands could not be agreed to.

RESUMES INQUIRY INTO CARMAN CASE

Subpoena Has Been Issued for Mrs. Carmen's Niece— Is Near Conclusion.

Mineola, N. Y., July 15.—The grand jury today resumed its investigation into the case of Mrs. Florence Carman, held in jail charged with the killing of Mrs. Louise Bailey in Dr. Carman's office at Freeport on the night of June 30. It was expected the jury would complete its work today and that if an indictment were found it would be returned tomorrow.
