



The engineers said they had hausted every effort to avert a strike and that effective means to force the railroads to action would follow.

favorable reply was received The railroads, through their general nanagers' committee, contend that to grant the employers' demands would mean an increase of \$33,000,000 an-nually in wages. The engineers and firemen say that their requests are fair and equitable.

Should negotiations fail and the emoloyes stand by their announcement the resulting strike would directly offect 55,000 engineers and firemen and into the case of Mrs. Florence Carman, indirectly a much larger number of workers.

The principal requests made by the mployes of the roads, were Increases in the rates of pay of engineers and firemen in all classes of service Number of hours after which overlime will be paid in freight service be reduced from ten to eight hours and in passenger service from ten to five hours. Overtime be raised to a basis of time and a half in freight service and double time in passenger service. Engineers and firemen to be paid an arbitrary 30 minutes preparatory time for each trip, instead of computing service continuously from actual time of reporting for duty. Allowances be made for terminal delays in addition to payment for the miles or the hours of the trip. Differentials paid for running Mallet engines be increased. Differentials between local and through freight service be increased. Two firemen be employed on large


