HEALTH CONDITIONS ARE COMMENDED

Report of State Board Issued Yesterday Afternoon Is Complimentary.

The preliminary report of the state department of health on the vital statistics for last year is just being made and Asheville as usual is highly commended.

The report says in part: "Seven towns in the state had a typhoid death rate of over 100,000. These in their order are, Sanford, first, with 188.3; Lenoir, second, 152.5; Hendersonville third, 129.0; High Point fourth, 124.1; Burlington fifth, 115.8; Forest City, sixth, 114.1; and Winston-Salem, seventh, 104.0. With typhoid death rates over five times as high as the average in the United States, these are no question but that these towns need to do some house cleaning and establish a health department."

"Of the seven largest cities in the state, as might be expected, Asheville with her excellent health department has the lowest death rate of 25.3, or just one half that of Greensboro, the next lowest with 50.4. The next in order after Greensboro are Durham 59.7; Charlotte 66.7; Raleigh 71.0; Wilmington 104.0. Health work pays big dividends in human life and health."

FINE WEATHER PREVAILED ALL DURING THE MONTH

Ideal Climate Condition Was The Rule in Asheville During July.

The monthly report of the local weather bureau for July, just issued, proves the assertion that the climatic conditions of Asheville are ideal.

The weather was not too hot and there was rain enough to keep down the heavy dust. While other cities throughout the country were sweltering in the July heat, with the mercury often standing over 100 degrees, Asheville only experienced one 90 degree day and that was on July 13. On the last day of the month the mercury registered 53.

STORY OF ELECTION OF MOTHER COBB

The following special from Belmont tells of the recent election of a successor to Mother Teresa: "The Sisters of Mercy of North Carolina assembled in their chapel in order to elect a successor to the lamented Mother Teresa who recently died in Asheville. There were 33 sisters present at the election. After invoking the Holy Ghost each sister in silence cast her vote. V. Rev. Dr. Felix, O. S. B., presided in the absence of Bishop Haid who is expected from Europe this week. Sister Cecelia Cobb received in the first ballot more than two-thirds of the votes of the community and was immediately approved and greeted as the Reverend Mother."

"She will at once assume the duties of her office. Mother Cecelia, a daughter of the late Dr. B. F. Cobb, was born in Duplin county, N. C. She entered the community as sister at the age of 20 and has held many responsible positions since then. For many years she was directress of Sacred Heart college at Belmont, then local superiors of the Wilmington house. She has numerous relatives throughout the state, who are well known and hold prominent positions."

"The Sisters of Mercy also formally passed the proposition of erecting a hospital on Elizabeth Heights in Charlotte, and a sanitarium on Biltmore avenue, Asheville."

"The ceremonies of the election were simple, but solemn. At the conclusion when the result had been announced the Rev. Dr. Felix congratulated the new mother in the name of the bishop and the Catholics in North Carolina, and wished her many years of able and successful administration."

"OUR HERO" CONSIGNED TO MONTFORD GRAVE

Sad Victim of an Aggressive Brother Is No More—Remembered by Friends.

Out in that section of Montford avenue which is just one mile from Pack square the smallest grave in the world was dug yesterday afternoon, just at the time when hundreds of business men were rushing home from their offices, automobiles were whirling by with loads of joy-riders and the street cars were bringing to the city the scores of people who had visited Riverside park during the afternoon. "Our hero" is buried in the grave. Some kindness, which not only sees the fall of every sparrow, but guides the last flutter of its wings, increased that a sparrow should die on Montford avenue yesterday afternoon and that five little girls should see him die and call him "our hero." The sparrow met death like a warrior brave, for he was attacked by a larger bird. And the five little girls, who were on Montford avenue playing, responded and did the only natural and fitting thing for little girls to do under such a circumstance of wonder and grief. With much sincere ceremony they planned and dug and laid him to rest. And then, awed by the beautiful grandeur of the thing they had done, they ran quickly away. "Goodbye, our hero," called out the littlest girl of all, as she waved her small hands at the grave. And now those who pass by, for the grave is on a lot only a few feet from the sidewalk, see the grave and marvel, for fairies or little children have been at work. The finest grave in all the world is soft, new, brown earth, as are all graves. At its head is a cross of tinfoil, glistening in the noonday sun and on the cross is slip of paper, printed in colored ink, "Our Hero." Someone as kind and gentle as the little girls came by and put a flower on the grave and tied it there with a white ribbon.

As people pass by, tired business men, idle youths on their way home or happy maidens out for a stroll, a tiny link of connection seems to have been made, by the thought of some children, between the rushing and bustling life of Montford avenue and that of the grave which sleeps and is still.
