An Ornament to Paris. The Place de la Concorde in Paris is one of the most beautiful places of its kind in the world. It was not until 1763 that the grounds were first adorned by the erection of an equestrian statue of Louis XV, and Gabriel, the architect, constructed the balustrades and pavilions that are seen today. The present design, however, was made by Hittorf in 1854. In 1792 the statue of the king was removed by the populace, and the square became known as the Place de la Revolution. During the bloody period the guillotine was placed here, and Louis XVI was executed on Jan. 21, 1793, and in the following October the unfortunate Marie Antoinette shared a like fate.

LABOR CELEBRATES ANNUAL HOLIDAY

Extensive Plans Have Been Made for Labor Day Celebration in Asheville on Monday—Fine Program Has Been Arranged at Riverside Park—Other Events.

WHAT TO DO FOR AMUSEMENT ON LABOR DAY.

Central Labor Union will have an all-day celebration at Riverside Park, commencing at 10 a. m. Program will include athletic and water sports; baseball games, morning and afternoon; music and dancing, and free moving pictures. Baptists of Asheville and Western North Carolina will spend the entire day on trip to the church orphanage at Thomasville; special train leaving Southern Railway passenger station at 7 a. m., Monday morning. Special Labor day offerings at the Majestic theater, two matinees, 2:30 and 4 p. m., and night at 7:30 and 9 p. m., presenting Jack Corbett's "Dream Girls," in high class music comedy and as an added attraction at all performances, "Baby Athlete," America's greatest child artist, the highest price single vaudeville act ever brought to this city; also "Albany," the noted rag-time pianist. Labor Day moving pictures at the Galax and the Princess; open from 10 a. m. to 10:30 p. m. Motorcyclists will have hill-climb between 2 and 3 p. m. on South French Broad avenue; assemble at J. M. Hearn's, on Government street. Good roads celebration, barbecue and picnic at Chimney Rock; local enthusiasts to participate. All stores belonging to the Retail Merchants' association of Asheville will be closed entire day; likewise the banks, Postoffice, courthouse and city hall to observe holiday hours. The Mountaineers toe and the Carolina League season at Charlotte with games both morning and afternoon; local amateur baseball games. Private picnics, barbecues and other outings galore. Colored people will hold their celebration at Oates park.

Business Will Suspend. Business will be practically suspended in Asheville on Monday. The business men agree that the day belongs to those that labor for a living and they are perfectly willing to sacrifice the business of an entire day in order that everybody may have a good time. The board of directors of the Asheville Retail Merchants association several days ago unanimously decided that all stores belonging to the association, and they are greatly in the majority, shall close their doors Monday. Banks, and other institutions will likewise observe the day.

The street railway management has assured the committee from the Central Labor union that everything possible will be done to make their day at Riverside park a complete success. With every car available in service from early in the morning until late at night, there should not be any delay in handling the enormous crowds expected to go to Riverside park. The negro population will celebrate at Oates baseball park the committee in charge having arranged an interesting program of events.

Baptists on an Excursion. The Baptists of Asheville and all of Western North Carolina have completed arrangements for their excursion to the church orphanage at Thomasville, where an interesting program will be carried out by the little ones. G. F. Stradley, manager of the excursion which will leave over the Southern railway, in a special train, Monday morning at 7 o'clock stated this morning that all is ready for the trip. It will be an inter-denominational affair, the public in general being invited. Those who go will carry lunches with them and a picnic will probably be arranged on the orphanage grounds. The special train will return to Asheville at a reasonable hour Monday night. Tickets to replace those stolen several days ago have been provided and all of the suspicious cardboards will be taken up at the passenger station.

Labor day is not a national holiday but is a state holiday in North Carolina and practically every other state in the union. In the District of Columbia the first Monday in September is recognized by congress as a legal holiday. Congress, however, has never set aside any day as a legal holiday, the Fourth of July not being excepted.
