SCENIC ROAD LAID OUT AROUND CHUNN'S COVE

County Engineer C. H. Neal has Surveyed Route for Proposed Highway.

If the plans of the residents of Chunn's cove and the board of county commissioners are carried out, Buncombe county will add another scenic road to the already long list in this county. Residents of Chunn's cove recently petitioned the board to have a road laid out in the cove and today County Road Engineer Charles H. Neal has been laying out this proposed road.

The new road will follow the old roadbed from Beaucatcher gap to connect with the road built by R. S. Howland at the head of Chunn's cove. If carried out according to the plans, the road will form a loop around Chunn's cove that will make it one of the most beautiful, from a scenic point of view, that can be found anywhere in this mountain section. It will come back around the cove by way of the old Overlook park and it is stated that at no place on the road will the grade be more than five and one-half per cent.

The matter of securing such a road has been agitated by the residents of the cove for some time, but is the first time that the proposition has reached the stage where the road has been laid out by the county engineer. It is believed that the road will be built at an early date and will be ready for travel.

BIDS TO BE RECEIVED ON WEAVERVILLE ROAD

Commissioners Will Examine Bids at Meeting Here Saturday.

At the regular mid-monthly meeting of the board of county commissioners, to be held next Saturday the committee recently appointed by the board to advertise for bids for the construction of the Asheville-Weaverville highway will meet with the board and the bids that are submitted on that day will be opened. It is highly probable that a contract will be let next Saturday for the rebuilding of the highway.

County Engineer Charles H. Neal stated today that from the numerous inquiries that he has received from firms in all sections of the country, calling for specifications, he thought that the board would receive a large number of bids at the meeting next Saturday.

The call for the bids includes all kinds of material and it is understood that bids will be submitted for at least six different kinds of surfacing for the highway.

If the contract for the construction of the highway is let next Saturday, it is understood that the county will proceed at once with building a four inch macadam base for the road, so that the road can be used during the winter by the people who travel over it, and the work of surfacing it will be started in early spring.

FOUR SOUTHERNERS ON RAILWAY BOARD

Southern Railway Now Has Majority of Southern Men on Board of Directors.

Division Passenger James H. Wood, of the Southern railway received the following important telegram this morning from Richmond, which will prove of general interest throughout the entire south, as well as in Asheville and western North Carolina:

"Dr. Edwin A. Alderman, president of the University of Virginia; John Kerr Branch, banker of Richmond; Dr. John C. Kilgo of Durham, bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church, South; Robert Jensen of Birmingham and Charles Steele of New York were today elected directors of the Southern Railway company, thus making a majority of the board southern men and fulfilling the hope expressed by President Fairfax Harrison in his first address before a southern audience when, at Chattanooga on January 20, last, he said:

"I look forward to the time when there may be more southern men on our board of directors."

"Mr. Steele succeeded himself, the four new directors filling vacancies caused by the death of W. W. Finley and H. C. Falmesworth, the resignation of George F. Baker, Jr., of New York and the death of Judge E. H. Gary of New York to accept re-election."

Judge Gary, who is chairman of the board of the United States Steel corporation, and Mr. Fiskier, who is allied with a number of other corporate officers, are retiring from the board of directors of the Southern railway largely in deference to public opinion of the present day in regard to interlocking directorates, despite the fact that both have been active and useful members of the Southern board.

"Today's meeting of the stockholders of the Southern railway was the first at which they have had the opportunity to directly take a hand in the management of its affairs and the election of directors, the voting trust, which has been in control since the organization of the company in 1894, now being in process of dissolution."

"A large number of stockholders attended the meeting in person and over 90 per cent of the total capitalization was represented. The meeting was open to the public and there was full and frank discussion of the report covering the operations of the company for the fiscal year ending June 30 and of the recently accomplished financing, before approval was voted."

"A number of directors and the principal officers were in attendance and answered questions asked by stockholders touching the management of the property and gave all information requested in regard to the affairs of the company and the progress of the territory which is served."
