While it is thought, of course, that a great amount of trash, rubbish and garbage will be removed next week, it is believed that the amount will not equal former "clean-up" weeks, owing to the fact that the sanitary department has been gathering the trash and rubbish in the yards of houses since last fall and where charges were made before that none are now made.
