

Constitutionality of the Webb-Kenyon Liquor Law In-

volved in Case.

Washington, May 7.-The first case involving the constitutionality and the construction of the Webb-Kenyon liquor law by which congress sought to divest liquor of the interstate privileges which could be used in violation of state laws was up for argument before the Supreme court today. The case concerns the carrying of liquor by express companies into dry territory in Kentucky. A similar case involving transportation of whiskey has been brought from West Virginia and was advanced to be heard with the Kentucky case. Cases of like nature have arisen in Oregon, Delaware, Mississippi, Tennessee, Iowa, Texas, Alabama, Kan-sas, South Carolina, North Carolina Virginia.


