MOB SURGED ON FIELD AFTER GAME

Raw Decisions by Luzon Caused Angry Demonstration by Bunch of "Near" Fans.

CHARLOTTE WON THIRD STRAIGHT GAME HERE

Winston and Durham Divided a Double Bill and Raleigh Won From Patriot Team.

Charlotte, with a bunch of fuff and the contrivance of the umpire managed to emerge with a victory over the Mountaineers yesterday by the score of three to two, it being the third straight game the Hornets won over Asheville.

In the ninth inning with Fenton on first base as the result of a free trip, Hewell hit over the initial sack. The ball cleared the bag and then continued outside of the foul line. Umpire Luzon who had been handing the locals adverse decisions all afternoon called the ball foul, and made Hewell return from second to resume batting, and recalled Fenton from third where he had gone on the hit, to first base again. Manager Corbett was banished from the coaching box to the bench for protesting against the poor decision. After Hewell struck out and Perritt filled out to left field, Woodall knocked a beauty down the third base line for two bases, scoring Fenton. Fortune was unable to do anything and was tossed out by the pitcher.

After the game a mob of incensed fans rushed onto the field to attack the umpire, but Chief of Police L. E. Perry and some of his policemen were "Johnnies on the spot" and "The Honorable Mr." Luzon probably has to thank the Asheville constabulary that he escaped personal injury.

Charlotte scored her runs in the second stanza. Wofford the first man to bat hit to left field for two bases. Wassam followed with a bunt down the third base line and Hewell's throw to first was much too high for Bumb to handle, both men being safe. Wassam continued to second on Bumb's throw to the plate which was too late to catch Wofford. Munch singled to left garden scoring Wassam and continued to third when Wassam booted the ball as he crossed the plate. Munch scored on Doak's infield hit.

In the sixth inning with Hickman on first and one out Fenton singled to left. Fenton was put out on Hewell's sacrifice but Hickman continued to third base from where he scored on Perritt's single. This was the only run made by the locals until the ninth inning.

The game was an interesting one and a good attendance was registered. The pitching was about even, Asheville gathering seven bingles from Geary while Fortune allowed seven. The fielding was good on both sides, Jimmy Hewell Asheville's third baseman and Perritt in the outfield giving an exhibition of pretty work.

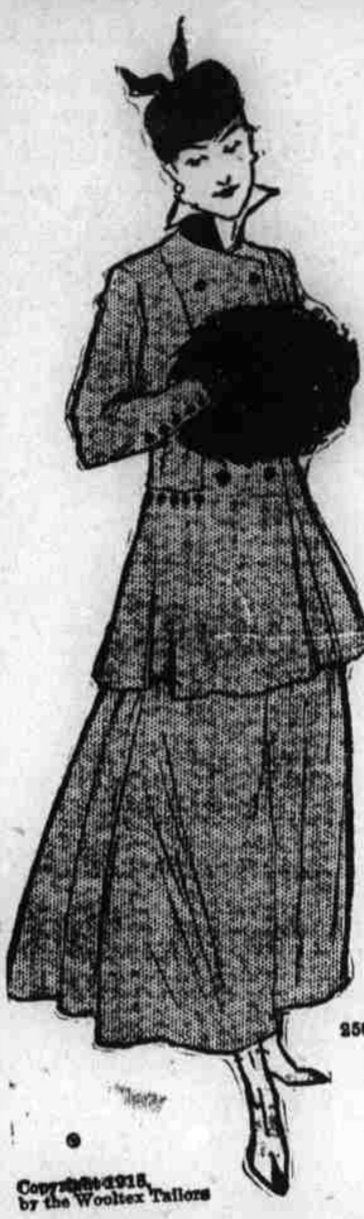
