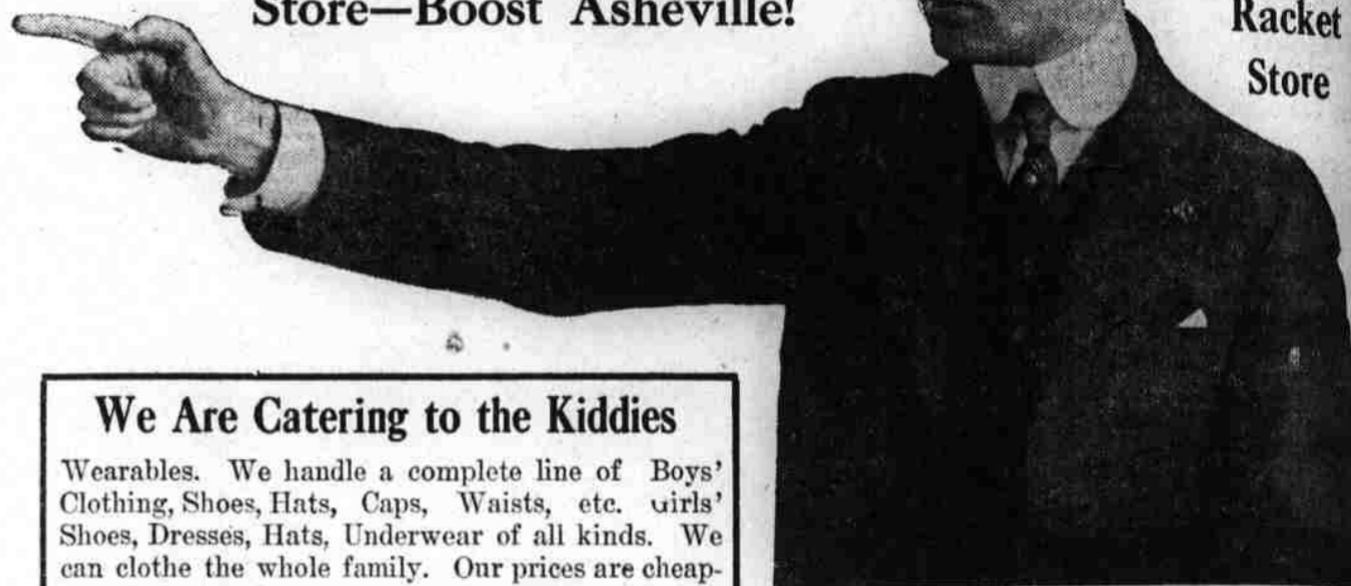

CONCORD WILL HAVE \$100,000 WORTH OF PAVING

Concord, Oct. 25.—More of the streets in Concord are in the process of being paved. The board of city commissioners have approved a plan to pave three streets and sections of three others. This is in addition to the paving work now under way on West Depot street from the depot to the St. Cloud hotel. The total cost of the

work is estimated at \$100,000. R. M. Hudson of Atlanta has the contract for paving West Depot and North Union streets to the Locke mill. The contract for paving the other streets has not been awarded.
Plans are on foot, it is understood, for rebuilding the Kennapahuis road. This road was contributed several years ago and was one of the first macadam roads in the state to be treated with an asphalt binder. For a time the road held up, but owing to lack of attention and the increased heavy traffic, it "cracked" under the strain. Now a practically new road

will have to be constructed. A special meeting of the county commissioners will be held next Wednesday to consider the matter.
A meeting of the trustees of the Jackson Training school was held at the St. Cloud hotel recently. The reports of Superintendent Boger and other reports were received.
Cabarrus Superior court will convene next Monday. Judge Lane of Holdenville will preside.

CROP VALUES IN STATE HAVE GREATLY INCREASED

Chapel Hill, Oct. 25.—"Crop values in North Carolina have increased \$181,000,000 in the last 15 years; the increase from 1900 to 1910 was \$75,000,000 and from 1910 to 1915 \$76,000,000—1,000,000 more in the last five years than in the previous ten—

such was the statement of R. E. Price of Rutherfordton county, while reading a paper before the North Carolina club. His subject was, "Diversity of Products in North Carolina."
In the course of his talk Mr. Price compared North Carolina with the great agricultural State of the Middle West Wisconsin.
"We find," he said, "that North Carolina raises everything that Wisconsin raises, except flax-seed and spelt. We raise, moreover, a greater abundance of everything except hay and forage, animal products, oats and barley. Wisconsin cannot grow cotton and pec-

nuts at all; whereas they are two of our most important crops. North Carolina grows more corn than does Wisconsin, four times as much tobacco, \$1,500,000 more in vegetables, and twice as much wheat."
Mr. Price then proceeded to show how adaptable the North Carolina soil is and to what extent diversification may be carried on. His paper contained numerous interesting and significant figures; and he also made use of a chart constructed by himself for the occasion.
