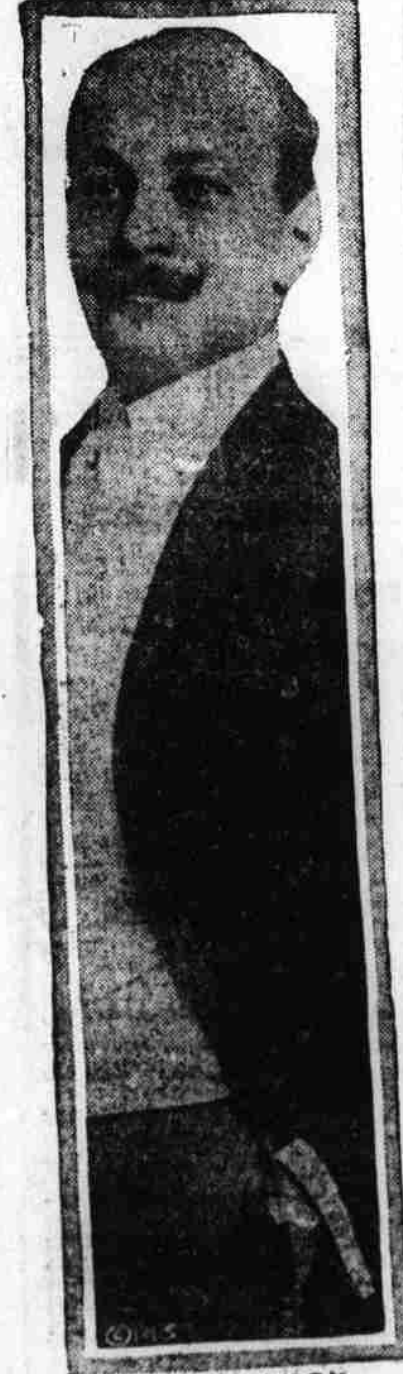

DR. ADOLPH EICHORN

Dr. Adolph Eichorn, chief of the pathological division of the bureau of animal industries at Washington, whose newly discovered anthrax serum has been successfully used on 71 year old Judge George F. Stackpole, of Riverhead, L. I., in Bellevue hospital, New York.

Judge Stackpole is the first human being on whom the serum has been tried. Four cases of anthrax, a tropical animal disease have been reported in New York alone, during the last year. The first three cases were fatal, and Judge Stackpole was given up to die when the serum was rushed from Washington. After two injections of the serum in his veins, the judge showed decided improvement and the physicians say that his chances for recovery are good.

Dr. Eichorn has experimented with his serum on animals and lost but 17 cases out of 500.

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ADMIRAL PEARY AS AN AVIATOR. REAR ADMIRAL PEARY READY FOR FLIGHT.



New York, Nov. 15.—Rear Admiral Robert Peary, the discoverer of the North Pole, is delighted at his latest flirt with death, namely, a trip in a aeroplane. The intrepid explorer made a light at Long Beach with Aviator Frank H. Burnside in a Curtiss flying boat, according to a report of 1,200 feet.
