## OFFICERS CONDUCT LONG STILL HUNT

J. M. Newton and Charles Stewart Capture Big Plant In Avery County. TRAVELED 100 MILES.

Following the track of the blockade distiller of corn juices over trails covered with snow in the mountains of Mitchell, Avery and parts of Burge and McDowell counties, Deputy Collector John M. Newton and Special Employee Charles Stewart, this week covered about 100 miles of territory in a general raid which ended with the destruction of one of the largest outfits captured in recent months. Near Ingalls postoffice in Avery county a fine copper still of 78.5 gallons capacity was located after many old blockade sites had been found, these having been abandoned for better fields for operation. Twelve fermenters of beer ready for distillation into whiskey were discovered together with some low wines. The total loss to the owners of the plant is approximately \$500, considering the value of the product when ready for the market. Always difficult to find, and doubly so when Uncle Sam's representatives strike out without a local guide, the sleuths pursued a trail cold in more ways than one until they saw a negro watering some horses at a well. Stewart discovered the factory, which had been in recent operation, and the go-devil hatchets of the "revenuers" made short work of a boiler that had evidently been a source of private and public satisfaction for a long time.
