CHAPEL HILL DURHAM BOULEVARD PLANNED

Movement Started to Construct 16-Foot Modern Road Between Two Towns.

Chapel Hill, March 20.—A 16-foot boulevard with a roadway on either side, running between Durham and Chapel Hill may be constructed as result of plans of Chapel Hill board of trade, Durham chamber of commerce, Rotary club and Durham merchant association. The road at present is in wretched condition when it should be one of the best in the state, on account of its location. Over it travel students from every part of North Carolina. Every year at the Road Institute in Chapel Hill it is observed by road engineers and commissioners from all quarters of the state. As a model road it would thus have a great educational influence. The meeting was unanimous in its approval of the prospect. Hearty cooperation was promised in speeches by R. O. Everett of the Durham chamber of commerce; E. I. Buger of the Durham Rotary club; W. H. Muse of the Durham Retail Merchants association and Col. John S. Cunningham a delegate at large. Dr. Joseph Hyde Pratt, Dr. T. A. Webb and R. L. Strowd represented Chapel Hill. Dr. Pratt, state geologist and secretary of the State Highway commission, outlined plans for the boulevard, announcing that seven manufacturers of road materials had offered to furnish free material for the paving of one mile of the road. The only provision is that the county lay the road material.

President A. S. Wheeler of the Chapel Hill board of trade appointed a committee to confer at once with a committee in Durham with a view to pushing the project.

It is also proposed that the Chapel Hill-Durham road be straightened and on either side of the boulevard to have a wide dirt or sand clay road. The manufacturers have agreed to furnish the necessary material merely for the advertisement they will get from it and also for the benefit of the test of the various materials.

WILL DISCUSS HOME GARDENING

Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Y. M. C. A. those interested in home gardening will meet for discussion of this matter instead of Tuesday afternoon. The Civic league and Women's clubs are especially invited, together with others who are interested. Commissioner Ramsey will talk about the "Dignity of Agriculture as a Profession," and County Farm Demonstrator F. D. Weaver will talk about the economic value of the home gardening work to the city. Those having vacant lots willing to donate them for this purpose are requested to notify the board of trade.
