WAR STAMPS FOR PARCEL POST AFTER DECEMBER 1

One Cent for Packages of 25 Cents Postage or Each Fraction Thereof

After December 1, a war tax stamp will have to be paid on all parcel post packages on which the postage amounts to 25 cents or over. The tax will be one cent for each package for transportation.

This order, going into effect as it does, just at the beginning of the Christmas season, will reach thousands of Asheville people, who will be sending packages during the holidays.

The order is as follows: "The commissioner of internal revenue shall furnish to the postmaster, general, without prepayment, a suitable quantity of adhesive stamps to be distributed to and kept on sale by the various postmasters in the United States. The postmaster-general may require each postmaster to give additional or increased bond in such form as he may by regulations prescribe. The postmaster-general shall at least once monthly transfer all collections from this source to the treasury as internal revenue collections."

DEFENSE SOCIETY ASKS COOPERATION

Directors of Lumber Association Sign Petition Asking Action Against Disloyalty—Will Consider Proposals

Richard M. Hurd, chairman of the board of directors of the American Defense Society, has forwarded to Secretary-Traffic Manager George L. Forrester of the Western Carolina Lumber and Timber association a number of proposals on which the membership of the association is asked to take action. These propositions are intended to crystallize sentiment among business men in support of the government and to create public opinion in favor of certain measures which congress will be asked to enact when it convenes.

The proposals are as follows: "That the United States should send an overwhelming force of men to France. The society suggests 10,000,000 as the proper proportion this nation should bear of the burden of the conflict. To intern alien enemies and enemy sympathizers whose conduct impedes the progress of the war. A formal petition accompanies the proposals which asks congress to provide for the punishment of those who by disloyal speech or act obstruct enlistment or hold up to ridicule or obloquy the United States or its allies. This petition is being signed by members of the lumbermen's association. To warn Germany that departures by her from the rules of war will not be endured. To forbid the publication of newspapers or magazines in the German language during the war. To forbid compulsory study of German in the public schools. To ask congress at its next session to declare that a state of war exists with Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey; to expel disloyal members and to forbid the issuance of securities except by federal license. Mr. Forrester has distributed these propositions among the directors of the association, requesting them to express their opinions on them at once by letter to the Defense society. The society at first planned for a referendum on these questions through the chamber of commerce of the United States, but decided to take up the matter directly with various organizations to save time. The proposals close with the following in regard to a peace that would leave German militarism free to prepare itself for another conflict: "Believing that an inconclusive peace would be an insult to those who have fallen in the war and a betrayal of the living, and that such a peace would infallibly lead to future wars, this society hereby declares that it is firmly in favor of prosecuting the war to a satisfactory and definite conclusion, thereby destroying Germany's power for international evil." It is believed that all the directors will endorse the proposals.

FOUR DISTILLERIES ARE SEIZED BY OFFICERS

Revenue Men Have Been Active In Three Counties

Having had a hand in putting out the manufacture of untaxed spirits, Former Sheriff J. H. Reed last night of business this week four plants for returned from a raid which took in three counties.

On Tuesday Officers Reed and J. A. Galloway made a good beginning by capturing two stills in Transylvania county, in the Toxaway section. At each place the raiders seized and destroyed about 1,000 gallons of beer ready for distillation. These factories had been in recent operation; in fact, the fire was burning under one furnace when the officers arrived.

The next day Reed and Galloway visited the Dunn's Rock territory, about four miles from Brevard, and another outfit for making \$30 out of a bushel of corn was chopped to pieces. This still had been active service within the last three or four days.

Leaving Mr. Galloway to watch the Transylvania blockaders, Mr. Reed and R. P. Harris went over into Swain county to see what preparations were being made there by the moonshiners for Thanksgiving day. Near Forney, where the Carr Lumber company has a large band sawmill, the raiders captured a complete outfit, the vital parts of which were constructed of fine copper.
