**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency JOHN M. MOREHEAD,  
Governor, Captain General, and Commander-in-Chief  
of the State of North Carolina.

WHEREAS, it has been made appear to the Executive Department, that at the last Term of the Superior Court of the county of Cabarrus the Grand Jury found a true Bill against MARK KISOR, for the murder of JAMES S. RUSSELL; and that said Kisor has fled from justice:

Now, Therefore, to the end that said Mark Kisor may be arrested and brought to trial for the said offence, I hereby issue this my Proclamation offering a reward of Two Hundred Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said Mark Kisor, to the Sheriff of Cabarrus; And I do, moreover, hereby enjoin and require all Officers of this State, Civil and Military, to use their best exertions to apprehend, and to cause to be apprehended, the said fugitive aforesaid.
