The General Conference. The Conference of Wednesday last took action in relation to expunging the rule about buying and selling persons with the intention of enslaving them. That our readers may understand the precise action of the Conference we publish the Report of the Com-

mittee:

Whereas, the rule in the General Rules of he Methodist Episcopal Church, South, forbidng "the buying and selling of men, women and children, with an intention to enslave them," is ambiguous in its phraseology, and liable to be construed as antagonistic to the institution of slavery, in regard to which the circulation restored, or death is the certain and Church has no right to meddle, except in enforcing the duties of masters and servants, as set forth in the Holy Scriptures; and whereas, a strong desire for the expunging of said rule has been expressed in nearly . all parts of our ecclesiastical connection; there-

> Resolved, 1. By the delegates of the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the General Conference assembled, that the rule forbidding "the buying and selling of men, women and children, with an intention to enslave them," be expunged from the General Rules of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

> Resolved, 2. That in adopting the foregoing resolution this Conference expresses no opinion in regard to the African slave trade, to which the rule in question has been "understood" to refer.

Resolved, 3. That the Bishops, or others presiding in the Annual Conferences, be and are hereby instructed to lay the foregoing resolutions before each of the Annual Conferences at their next ensuing sessions, for their concurrent action.

Resolved, 4. That the President of each Annual Conference shall be required, as soon as possible after the adjournment of the Conference, to report to the Book Editor the vote on the resolution to expunge the rule in question; and when the Book Editor shall have received returns from all the Annual Conferences voting on the said resolution, he shall lay the information before one of the Bishops; and if it shall be found that there is a conpress the highest satisfaction with the success who have witnessed or performed themselves currence of three-fourths of all the members of the Annual Conferences present, and gy, &c., without being moved by the taunts voting on the resolution in favor of the expunging of the rule, the Bishop shall direct the Book Editor to expunge it accordingly.
