

WELL SAID.

The Louisville Courier-Journal well says that Winfield Scott Hancock will be the next President of the United States. It is written in the book of fate, and there will be no Electoral Tribunal to revise the returns. Hancock was born both handsome and lucky. He is a man of destiny. Why, just look at the record. In 1868 Garfield brought a bill into Congress to drop the junior Major General. That was Hancock. It passed both Houses of Congress and was signed by the President. But before it could be carried into effect George H. Thomas, the senior Major General, died, and Hancock, going up a grade, was no longer the junior Major General, and so the law could not reach him. Then the Republicans, still led by Garfield, passed an act reducing the Major Generals to three. This was signed by the President, but before it could be carried into effect Meade died, and the Major Generals were then reduced to three by God Almighty. Finally, a law was passed authorizing the President to drop one of the Major Generals. Before it could be carried out Hancock was dropped, Halleck died, and Hancock, becoming the senior Major General, could not be dropped. The man who survived all these attempts to retire him cannot be retired. The man who led them—Garfield—will, as a fitting consummation of his act, fall a victim to his intended victim. Hancock will be elected President. Garfield will be retired—at least from the Presidential field.

HON. KEMP P. BATTLE, LL. D., PRESIDENT.
Prepared for College by Messrs. Lovejoy and Brown. Entered University of N. C. in 1845. Graduated, delivering the valedictory, in 1849. Messrs. P. M. Hale and T. J. Robinson were also first mite men. Was tutor of Mathematics four years, elected President in '76. LL. D. conferred by Davidson College in '79. Of his political honors two columns would scarcely tell!
CHAS. PHILLIPS, D. D., LL. D.
Prepared for College by his father, Rev. James Phillips. Distinguished the honors of his class in the University of N. C. with Hon. S. F. Phillips, Solicitor General of U. S. Professor in the University till '68. Elected Professor in Davidson College, which place he held until he was recalled to his old chair in '75.
FREDERICK W. SIMONDS, Ph. D.
Prepared for College by James McNeill, A. M., at Richmond, Indiana, High School. Entered Cornell '71. Graduated B. S. in '75. Elected instructor in Geology, in Cornell University. M. S. in '76, conferred by Cornell. Ph. D. conferred, after a test examination, by Syracuse University, '79. Obtained during his collegiate course, two prizes—one in Geology and one in Zoology.
H. H. GRAVES, B. Sc., C. & M. E.
Prepared for College by his father, who was afterwards associated with H. Horner, Esq., in school of Horner & Graves. Had been two years at the University of N. C. when it was broken up by the Revolution. Entered University of Va. after a course of remarkable brilliancy at that institution, he graduated with his present degree in '74. His recommendation were such that he was the first Professor elected in 1875, when our University was reconstituted. As a mathematician he has had no rival in the University of Va. for a number of years. He was Professor in his father's famous school—Horner & Graves—till his election to his present position.
GEORGE T. WINSTON.
Prepared for College by J. H. Rogers, Esq. Had been two years in the University of N. C. when the Revolution broke it up. Becoming a Whig at Annapolis, he rose at Annapolis and his was the first name in the class of '46. Ill health caused his resignation, when entering Cornell he was graduated in '74. Was elected Professor of Mathematics in Cornell University as instructor in Math-

ematics. Received the prize in Latin during his collegiate course. C. D. GRANDY.
Was likewise prepared for College by J. H. Horner. Entered Virginia Military Institute and graduated first in his class in '75. Was honored with the Senior Captaincy, and was the recipient of two medals.
J. DEB. HOOPER, A. M.
Prepared for College by Messrs. Rogers and Bingham. Entered the University of N. C. in 1828. Graduated with the degree of A. B. Was valedictorian of a class consisting of Judge Grant, Giles Mebane, Esq., and others. Elected to his present position in 1875.
A. W. MANGUM.
Prepared for College by Rev. T. J. Horner, and by Rev. J. A. Dean, and Rev. B. F. Larrabee—who were graduates of Wesleyan University, Conn. Joined the Sophomore Class in Randolph Macon in 1851. Graduated A. B., with first honor in 1854. A. M. conferred in 1857. D. D. in 1880. Elected to his present position in 1875.
T. W. HARRIS, M. D.
Prepared for College by Rev. Daniel McGilvary, D. D., and Mr. L. J. Merritt, a graduate of class of '54. (U. N. C.) Entered University of N. C. in July, '55, and graduated in June '59, receiving first distinction with G. B. Johnston, Rev. Alex. Kirkland, Maj. W. B. Lynch and Francis D. Stockton. Served 4 years in Confederate army, obtain rank of captain, commanding a squadron of cavalry. After the war spent two years in Ecole de Médecine, of Paris, and returning to this country graduated at University of New York. Established a preparatory school of medicine at Chapel Hill, in '78, which the Trustees connected with the University in the spring of '79, making the founder of the school Professor of Anatomy and Materia Medica.

And a significant fact is that the best teachers so inspire their pupils with the love of knowledge that they wish to impart it to others. The surest test of the standing of a school is the number and quality of its graduates who become instructors. Says Goldsmith: The teacher is more necessary to a State than the minister. For, the father can, but the son cannot, dispense with instruction. If the most useful lives are the most glorious the names of conscientious school masters will never die.
PROF. DABNEY.
Prof. Charles Wm. Dabney, Jr., is son of Rev. Dr. R. S. Dabney, the distinguished President of the Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Virginia, and author of Life of Stonewall Jackson. Prof. Dabney is a graduate of the University of Virginia. He completed the courses and obtained degrees in General, Analytical, and Agricultural Chemistry, Physics, &c., and has the highest testimonials from Professors Mallett, Harrison, and the other Professors of that institution.
After leaving the University of Virginia, Prof. Dabney was for three years Professor of Chemistry in Emory and Henry College. Here he was distinguished for learning in his department and for skill in the management of students. The Professors of this College say that he was one of the best teachers ever connected with their faculty.
Desiring to pursue his researches

further in Chemistry, Prof. Dabney resigned his post at Emory and Henry and joined the celebrated University of Göttingen, where by his skill and success in his studies he has recently attained the degree of Ph. D. It was at the same University that Dr. Ledoux finished his chemical education and obtained his degree.
Prof. Dabney will reach the University in October. He will be at home here. He is grandson of the venerable Dr. Morrison, one of the oldest living graduates of our institution—the class of President Polk, Bishop Green and others. He is a nephew of Mrs. Stonewall Jackson, also a near connection of our distinguished Governor Graham. He is about 27 years old, of vigorous health, and is a man of very fine talents, good address, and of great industry and energy.
