When the vote was put, the "delegates" looked one at the other. not knowing what to do, but after the resolutions were read over again, some one managed to gain courage enough to vote, and all followed suit.

So the Provisional Government was established. If this is not a "big thing," I don't know what is. On the 28th, Mr. Foster was elected to the United States Congress for this district.
