COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 11.—The Perrin, an engine belonging to the South Carolina railroad, exploded here this morning, while standing in the yard. An engineer named Keen, was instantly killed, and one fireman had his skull fractured very badly and is considered mortally wounded.

From the West.

Received in Charlotte, Feb. 11 at Bulletin Office 4:30 p. m. MEMPHIS, Feb. 11.—We have sustained a heavy loss in steamboats, on the Tennessee River, in consequence of the invasion. The gunboats Lexington, Conestoga and Sam Orr, with 17,000 pounds powder, and two submarine batteries, were set fire to at 8 o'clock this evening, ten miles above the Tennessee River Bridge.

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
