A British steamer has arrived at New York with a cargo of East India cotton. Market irregular, 28 to 30 cents; corn 65.

Dispatches from S. Louis dated night of 14th inst, 20 killed 2,500 wounded at Fort Donelson, up to that time. Fighting desperate, terrific.

Official dispatches from Barnside dated Goldsboro, have been received at Washington. Received in Charlotte, Feb. 16, 1862, at Bulletin Office 12:00 a. m.

Fort Donelson, Feb. 16, 10:30 a. m.—One of the fiercest battles on record commenced this morning about 7 o'clock, on our left wing.

We have driven the enemy past his camp with great slaughter. The fighting still rages with great fury on both sides. Our boys are fighting with great gallantry, driving the enemy as they go.

11 o'clock, A. M.—We have captured 3 of the enemy's batteries and repulsed them every where. The Tennessee, Mississippi, Texas and Alabama regiments, and others are doing the thing finely.

12:30 P. M.—I can safely say the day is ours. Enemy lost tremendous. About two hundred Yankee prisoners just brought in, report a number of their regiments nearly annihilated.

1:30 p. m.—We fought the enemy outside of our entrenchments from 5:30 this morning, to one this afternoon, driving him inch by inch from every point of the field, capturing 4 pieces of artillery, a large number of prisoners.

Our loss heavy but we have inflicted heavier loss on the enemy. The Federals are largely reinforced and may attack us again.

It is reported Hindman had a sharp engagement yesterday morning, with Federals, who are advancing in force. Hindman fell back in good order, and after crossing Barren River blew up the Railroad Bridge, burned turnpike Bridge between 10 and 11 o'clock the Federals shelled Bowling Green, setting the town on fire, burning nearly all the town.

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
