# MESSAGE

# President JEFFERSON DAVIS.

Received at Telegraph Office, Feb. 26, 1862. Received at Bulletin Office, 5:00 p. m. RICHMOND, Feb. 25 .- The President has sent his Message to Congress. He says since the delivery of the last Message. events have demonstrated that the Government attempted more than it had the power successfully to achieve, hence in its effort to protect the whole territory and seaboard, inland, it has been so unfortunate as recently to encounter serious disasters. At the formation of Government, we

were great in extent, but destitute in the means of prosecuting the war on so gigantic scale as that attained .- work shops were meinly found North and our first object was to establish necessary manufactures, and in the mean time purchase in Europe as far as practicable, whatever was required for the public detence.

In April last, active military preparations in Europe interposed many obstacles to the procurement of arms.

He says he has no official report of the discomfitures at Roanoke and Fort Donelson. Enough known of the surrender at Roanoke to make us feel deeply humiliated, however imperfect may have been the means of defence, he still entertained hope.

Our reported loss at Fort Donelson was greatly exaggerated. In-as-much as we were not only unwilling but unable to believe that a large army of our people would surrender without a desperate effort to cut their way through investing forces, whatever may have been their number, and endeavor to make a Junction with other divisions of the army. But, in the absence of official reports, premature statements were accredited. In the meantime strenuous efforts were made to forward reinforcements to the army at positions threatened, and I cannot doubt that bitter disappointment we have borne is moving the people to still greater exertions, will speedily secure results more accordant with our position and as favorable to our cause as those which marked earlier periods of the war. He says the reports Secretaries of War and Navy, exhibits resources to conduct the war have accumulated, notwithstanding serious difficulties, against which we have contended, fully equal meet future wants. He condemns the policy of short enlistments, and considers that it partly contributed to the

recent reverses. When the war broke out the general opinion was in favor of short enlistment. hence the people were naturally averse to long enhaument. Now the war will probably continue through a series of years and our high spirited and gallant soldiers, while generally re enlisting, are compelled in many instances to go home and make arrangements for their families during their

protractis absence. Quotas of new Regiments for the war in all the States are in rapid progress of organization. The whole body of men levies and re-enlistments will, probably, be ready in 30 days. The number of Reg. iments in the field is four hundred infantry
