Military Despotism of the . North.

The New York World, an able Republican organ, thus speaks of the letters de cachet, which, for a number of months, have been issued by the Lincoln Government. It says : .

Patiently as the people had submitted to the summary procedures of the State Department, in arresting on mere suspicions of treason, and confining for weeks and months without trial, they still felt it to be a deep public misfortune. It was in direct conflict with the guarantees of the constitution, and a most dangerous precedent for future times, and was taken by the powers abroad as a virtual acknowledgment that the constitution of the republic was not adequate to its own protection; and as a proof of the desperate condition of the Federal cause.

The letters de cachet were an unheard of thing in any country not ruled by a despot. Never before since the Barons exacted Magna Charta at Runnymede, did the Anglo-Saxon race submit to such an assumption of power. The fact, extraordinary as it is, is incontrovertible that the American Secretary of State has exercised the power in immuring the American citizens without judicial warrant or trial, which Charles I. or James II., in the utmost stretch of his royal prerogative, never durst attempt,
