France is sending more troops to Mexico. Cotton has advanced #d@ld. Stock on hand 400,000 bales.

Austria is strengthening her military ports on the Venetian frontier.

Northern papers of Tuesday have been received at Nortolk. They report that the captured steamer Magnolia arrived Monday with her cargo of cotton.

The Herald says Virginia will be con quered without much bloodshed.

In New York, stocks are languishing Cotton slightly declined ;' sales 28 cents. General Curtis, of Arkansas, has issued a special order emancipating all slaves now employed in the rebel service.
